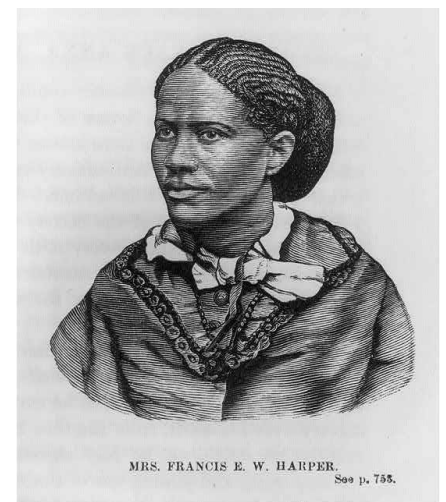
## Who you gonna call?

Who should you call when your link doesn't work? You are searching the library discovery service or a database, and you click a link to get a full-text article – and it won't work. Or you can't even get into a database you are used to using. We feel your pain! Luckily, we have a person dedicated to resolving this issue for you: Cynthia Nyirenda, our Serials and Electronic Resources Librarian. The best way to contact Cynthia is via telephone (410-677-0116), e-mail ([cinyirenda@salisbury.edu](mailto:cinyirenda@salisbury.edu)), or the library's chat service. Cynthia will need a lot of information from you in order to help. For example, are you off campus or on? Are you in a database, or did you use the library's discovery service (the big search box on the library home page)? Be prepared to answer questions and send a screen shot of any error message on your computer screen. Be patient! It can sometimes take a couple of days to resolve an access issue, because it is often the vendor who has to fix something.
