





- SU is the No. 1 Fulbright Student producing institution in the Master's Carnegie Classification for 2022-23 (9 Student Fulbrights awarded). In the past decade, SU has had 39 Fulbright students.
- SU also has been recognized by the U.S. Department of State's Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs as one of the top producers of Fulbright Scholars (faculty).
- In the past decade, SU students have won more than 100 national and international fellowships, including the National Science Foundation Greater Research Fellowship, Charles B. Rangel Scholarship, Barry M. Goldwater Scholarship, Critical Language Scholarship, David L. Boren Scholarship, and Gates Cambridge Scholarship.
- The Princeton Review and U.S. Green Building Council have named SU among the nation's top "Green Colleges."
- 86% of soon-to-be SU graduates have reported accepting a job offer prior to graduation, and 99% of graduates seeking employment are employed within one year after graduation.
- 92% of fall 2023 incoming SU students received scholarships and financial aid.
- SU's Business, Economic and Community Outreach Network (BEACON) estimated the University's regional economic impact at some \$480 million in 2016.

- SU graduates join a growing network of more than 60,000 alumni worldwide, working for corporations including Amazon, JPMorgan Chase & Co., NASA, Perdue Farms, Under Armour, and The Walt Disney Co., to name just a few. The average salary of recent graduates is \$53,509.
- SU is home to 21 varsity athletics programs, with 23 NCAA Division III team championships and 24 individual national championships. Men's and women's golf begin in 2024-25.
- Students are involved in over 150 clubs and organizations, and SU is home to 19 nationally recognized fraternities and sororities.
- Historically, SU has had among some of the highest graduation rates in the University System of Maryland. In 2022-23, SU's already high retention rate increased from 76% to 80%.
- In fall 2023, SU welcomed nearly 1,400 new students as part of the Class of 2027. They represented 27 states and 18 countries, and included **178 student athletes and 180 honors students**. Almost a third were from underrepresented backgrounds, and **41% self-identified as first-generation students**. SU also welcomed more than 530 transfer students, and more than **320 new graduate students**.

- CHHS is SU's second established college and is comprised of three schools: Nursing, Social Work, and Health Sciences.
- The Center for Healthy Communities, established in 2020, promotes CHHS efforts in community-based learning, community service grants, workforce development, and professional continuing education opportunities. Programs include the School of Social Work's Behavioral Integration in Pediatric Primary Care (BHIPP) and School of Nursing's Faculty Academic and Mentorship Initiative of Maryland
- The Maryland Board of Nursing ranks SU as having the highest 10-year average pass rate of all University System of Maryland institutions on the National Council Licensure Examination for Registered Nurses.
- SU's Richard A. Henson Medical Simulation Center recently celebrated a decade of success. Under the Henson School at its founding in 2012, the center has provided education, promoted quality and patient safety, stimulated research and scholarship, and integrated evidence into clinical practice through the provision of invaluable simulation experiences for SU health professions students and community health care professionals.

- In 2019, CHHS extended program offerings across the state with the launch of SU's master's degree in health and human performance (then applied health physiology) at the Universities at Shady Grove (USG).
- The School of Social Work offers students across Maryland and abroad the opportunity to pursue degrees, with satellite programs through Cecil College, the Eastern Shore Higher Education Center at Chesapeake College, USM at Southern Maryland, USM at Hagerstown, and University of Maryland Global Campus Europe. The school also offers a dual-degree program in social work/ sociology with the University of Maryland Eastern Shore.
- The Center for Healthy Communities was awarded a \$1.98 million grant from the Health Resources and Services Administration to establish the SU Eastern Shore Opioid-Impacted Family Support Program (OISP).



- Students in the Fulton School's Creative Writing Program have published poems and short stories in national peerreviewed journals and literary magazines, and have won prominent awards including the Pablo Neruda Prize for Poetry.
- SU has been a designated United Nations Millennium Campus since 2020. Some **37 SU students have been** named UN Millennium Fellows, designing projects to assist in the achievement of the UN Foundation's 17 Sustainable Development Goals.
- Dr. Arun Gandhi, the late grandson of Indian leader Mahatma Gandhi, co-taught conflict analysis and dispute resolution courses in the Fulton School as the Bosserman Center's scholar-in-residence and led SU students during study abroad trips to India.
- Speakers in SU's Paul S. Sarbanes Lecture Series, hosted by the Fulton School-affiliated Institute for Public Affairs and Civic Engagement, have included civil rights leader John Lewis and Speaker of the House Nancy Pelosi. (President Joe Biden has served as an SU Commencement speaker.)
- Philosophy students in the Fulton School help to change lives through a longstanding book discussion program with inmates at nearby Eastern Correctional Institution through a partnership between SU and the Maryland Department of Public Safety and Correctional Services.

- Other unique offerings include the annual SU Philosophy Symposium, which has provided a forum for students and members of the greater community to discuss issues with philosophy scholars for more than 40 years, and "Re-envisioning Ethics Access and Community Humanities" (REACH), a National Endowment for the Humanities-funded program aimed at including an ethics component in undergraduate education experiences for fields including health, social work, and public administration.
- Six SU environmental studies students in the Fulton School have earned the prestigious U.S. Environmental Protection Agency Greater Research Opportunity (EPA-GRO) Fellowship, giving them the chance to work side-byside with EPA officials through paid internships while also earning college funding for their junior and senior year, worth up to \$50,000.
- All environmental studies students study at a campus ranked as one of the top "Green Colleges" in the U.S. by The Princeton Review and U.S. Green Building Council. They learn in the field and along the banks of the Chesapeake Bay from top-rated faculty including John Burroughs Award-winning environmental author Tom Horton.
- The Fulton School is the home of *Lit/Film Quarterly*, the longest-standing international journal devoted to the study of literature adaptation to film, founded in 1973.

- The Henson School's integrated science major, launched in fall 2020, was the first of its kind in the University System of Maryland.
- The National Science Foundation has awarded Henson School faculty and students over \$7 million in grant funding.

- The Henson Scholars initiative awards four \$3,000 and 12 \$2,000 scholarships each year, which are renewable as long as the student maintains eligibility.
- The Henson School's high-performance computing lab, established using funds from a \$2.5 million gift from the Richard A. Henson Foundation in 2017, features a Beowulf cluster designed for both classroom instruction as well as a research cluster.
- The Eastern Shore Regional GIS Cooperative (ESRGC), founded in 2004, partners with municipal, county, regional, state, and federal governments, as well as private and non-profit organizations, in an effort to develop data-driven decision-making tools. The cooperative has established over 50 partnerships and are the Eastern Shore's leader in GIS services.
- In 2022, the Henson School opened SU's Real Robotics Lab, establishing a home base for the GULLS VEXU Robotics Team and research space for STEM students. The lab consists of drone and 3-D printing labs, engineering workstations, and a competition-standard VEX robotics arena.

- The Perdue School is home to the nation's second longest-running student entrepreneurship competition, first held in 1987, with a current annual prize pool of some \$100,000.
- Since 2013, the Perdue School also has been home to the Philip E. and Carole R. Ratcliffe Foundation Shore Hatchery entrepreneurship competition, through which small business owners and developers throughout the Mid-Atlantic vie twice a year for their share of a \$200,000 prize pool and mentorship from some of the region's most successful business owners. In the past decade, recipients have self-reported estimated profits of some \$100 million, creating nearly 700 jobs.
- The Perdue School has twice hosted national auditions for the hit ABC-TV show Shark Tank, with several Ratcliffe Foundation Shore Hatchery winners appearing and receiving business investment offers from the show's judges.
- The Perdue School's Mid-Atlantic Sales and Marketing Institute (MASMI) annually hosts students from around the U.S. for the National Shore Sales Challenge, a collegiate competition that allows students to sharpen their sales skills while networking with potential employers from more than a dozen national corporations.

- Since 1986, the Perdue School's Business, Economic, and Community Outreach Network (BEACON) has provided applied business and economic research support for hundreds of public and private entities, from state governments to Fortune 500 companies, giving SU students the hands-on experience they need to succeed after earning their degrees.
- Since 2001, Perdue School students have had the opportunity to earn real-world stock market experience through the Sea Gull Fund, a unique student-managed investment portfolio currently valued at more than \$2 million with gains that have outperformed the Standard & Poor's average.
- Fraud and Forensic Accounting Certificate Program students are partnering with the Worcester County State's Attorney Office to help investigate and curb elder fraud in what is believed to be the only program of its kind in the nation – thanks to a \$2.6 million grant from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.
- All students graduating with a Perdue School major are required to have an Applied Business Learning Experience (ABLE) internship, pairing on-the-job experience with a faculty-guided class as part of SU's ongoing commitment to experiential learning and career preparedness.
- Through the Cross-Atlantic Negotiation Competition, Perdue School students virtually join their counterparts at the University of Bucharest School of Law in Romania to practice international negotiation skills as part of a Fulbright-inspired faculty partnership.
- The Perdue School's Dave and Patsy Rommel Center for Entrepreneurship provides business and prototyping resources for students and community members, including a full makerspace.
- The Perdue School's undergraduate and M.B.A. programs have been AACSB-accredited since 1994.

- Seidel School faculty have received millions of dollars in grants for projects ranging from strengthening Maryland's child care system, to increasing teacher diversity and student success, to providing SU students with hands-on experience to better prepare them to work with students with disabilities.
- The Seidel School is working to reduce teaching gaps by producing more middle and high school educators in science and mathematics thanks to a \$1.2 million Robert Noyce Teacher Scholarship Program grant from the National Science Foundation.
- The Seidel School is helping migrant workers on the Delmarva Peninsula earn degrees through its College Assistance Migrant Program (CAMP), providing scholarship funding for first-year, full-time students who are engaged, or whose parents are engaged, in migrant and other seasonal farm work, thanks to a \$2.1 million grant from the U.S. Department of Education.
- The Seidel School has earned multiple National Association for Professional Development Schools (NAPDS) awards for its PDS partnerships in seven Maryland counties.
- In the past 30-plus years, the Seidel School's May Literacy Center has helped more than 1,000 local children in kindergarten through eighth grade catch up and excel in literacy comprehension.
- The Seidel School-affiliated Eastern Shore Child Care Resource Center provides leadership, training, coaching, program support, and other services to child care providers, and assists families with finding child care in an effort to help bridge the Maryland child care gap.
- Seidel School faculty serve as the editorial team for the International Literacy Association's *Journal of Adolescent* & Adult Literacy.
- The Seidel School is accredited by the Association for Advancing Quality in Educator Preparation (AAQEP).
- Over 50 SU graduates have been Teachers of the Year in the past decade. In recent years, seven of nine Eastern Shore school superintendents have been SU alumni, along with many Delmarva teachers and administrators.
- In 2023, the Seidel School received a nearly \$2.5 million Maryland Rebuilds: Growing a Highly Effective Childcare Workforce grant from the Maryland Department of Education to help child care workers and paraprofessionals earn their bachelor's degrees and teaching certifications in an effort to enhance opportunities for professional upward mobility.

- CHC includes over 40 affiliated faculty members covering more than 20 disciplines.

- CHC offers several options for incoming freshmen who wish to participate in an Honors Living Learning Community (LLC). These communities offer students a special opportunity to live and study together throughout their freshman year. Students in Honors LLCs are mentored by Resident Assistants (RAs), who are fellow members of the Honors College, in Manokin and Pocomoke residence halls.
- CHC students in the Honors Student Association give back to the surrounding community through acts of community service and outreach events such as the City of Salisbury's 3rd Friday activities and the Maryland Folk Festival.

- Student Health Services has been accredited by the Accreditation Association for Ambulatory Health Care (AAAHC), which is a symbol of quality care and requires SU to participate in ongoing self-evaluation to continuously improve care and services.
- Career Services welcomed 350 employers to campus last year to recruit SU students at University job fairs.

- For 30 years, student-founded and -operated Saferide has been providing free, safe and confidential transportation for students in the 3-mile radius of campus Thursday-Saturday evenings.
- Students created the Food for the Flock food pantry in 2018 to help address food insecurity among the campus community, providing free food and other non-perishable goods.
- Salisbury University currently is home to 19 fraternity and sorority organizations, each committed to the fulfillment of the core values of citizenship, membership, leadership and scholarship.
- Providing services to approximately 9% of SU's students, the Disability Resource Center also provides the AcessAbility Advocate Training program to promote disability awareness and understanding throughout the campus community.
- The Guerrieri Student Union coordinates over 2,300 reservations for events, conferences and meetings hosted at the facility each year.
- In addition to the longstanding 11 first-year Living Learning Communities for students of similar academic pursuits, beginning in fall 2023, Housing and Residence

Life offers new students the opportunity to choose housing options with similar interests/backgrounds through Special Interest Housing – options include: University Spirit; Transfer; Student Advocacy, Inclusion and Leadership; and Inclusion, Discovery, Equity, Allyship and Advocacy.

- SU has won 23 team national championships, 24 individual national championships and 196 conference championships since 1993.
- SU most recently won national championships with women's lacrosse and baseball in 2021, and men's lacrosse in 2023.

- The outdoor facilities at SU underwent significant upgrades starting in 2016 with new facilities for football, men's and women's lacrosse, field hockey, men's and women's soccer, baseball, softball, men's and women's tennis and intramurals.
- SU head men's lacrosse coach Jim Berkman is the all-time winningest coach in NCAA history. He has collected over 600 wins in his career and won 13 national championships.
- SU has several coaches that have been named to their respective sport Hall of Fame, including Dawn Chamberlin
 NFHCA Hall of Fame, 2009; Jim Berkman – National Lacrosse Hall of Fame, 2013
- There have been 44 College Sports Communicators Academic All-Americans, the highest student-athlete academic honor in the nation.
- Salisbury's Sea Gull Sports Network (SGSN) provides live video coverage of 19 of SU's 21 Division III varsity sports. One of the premiere student-driven streaming organizations, complete with multi-camera broadcasts, pregame shows, on-screen graphics and in-game highlights.
- Since 2018-19, Salisbury has had over 50% of eligible student-athletes on the all-conference academic honor roll. It is a streak of four consecutive academic years.

Ways to Study Abroad

- SU In: These strategic centers offer SU course work yearround. Fall, winter, spring or summer students can study abroad at an "SU In ..." site.
 - SU In Spain
 - SU In Scotland
 - SU In Costa Rica

 - SU In Italy (Coming Soon)
- Salisbury Abroad Exchanges: These semester-long study abroad programs cost the same (and sometimes less) than a semester in Salisbury. In addition to the SU In sites, there are Salisbury Abroad Exchanges in Ghana, France, South Korea, Sweden and Japan – with more sites under development.
- SU Global Seminars: SU faculty lead courses for two-four weeks during January and June. They are offered at the SU In sites as well as through other tours that vary year by year. Past Global Seminars have included Portugal, Honduras, France, England, Kenya, India, Iceland, Italy and South Africa.
- National Student Exchange (NSE): SU students spend a semester on exchange at more than 180 universities in the U.S., U.S. territories and Canada. Popular destinations include New Orleans, Alaska, Colorado and Hawaii. SU students pay the same cost as a semester in Salisbury.

Steps to Studying Abroad:

- Review program pages for particular program online (course requirements, costs, etc.)
- 2. Talk to a peer advisor
- 3. Set up a meeting with a study abroad advisor
- Meet with your academic advisor (to ensure desired program fits major/minor)
- 5. Apply to chosen program
- 6. Apply for study abroad financial aid
- Submit enrollment forms in the online application (this commits the student to participating)
- 8. Attend orientation meetings
- 9. Go abroad!

- More than 200 SU students study abroad every year.
- Study abroad semesters can be integrated into any fouryear degree.
- Students in any major can integrate a Salisbury Abroad semester as first-year students or sophomores.

- In many majors, students can integrate an internship or undergraduate research project with advanced courses in their major or minor during a Salisbury Abroad semester.
- Learning about coral reef biology in Honduras, media communications in Mumbai or global health in Cape Town are just a handful of the hundreds of opportunities available through SU Study Abroad.
- SU offers multiple study abroad scholarship opportunities for qualifying students.
- For those interested in studying in other parts of the U.S. instead of internationally, SU offers a variety of "study away" programs through National Student Exchange.
- With partner institutions on six continents, SU facilitates international exchange programs with universities around the globe.
- SU also welcomes international students in Salisbury, many of whom pursue English as a foreign language through SU's English Language Institute.

What Are High-Impact Practices?

The American Association of College and Universities shares that HIPs are teaching and learning practices that provide significant educational benefits for students who participate in them, including and especially those from demographic groups historically underserved by higher education.

- Among the key components of SU's General Education model (beginning fall 2024) are a First Year Seminar and Civic and Community Engagement requirement. All new students to SU must take a First Year Seminar to gain academic preparation and skills for educational and professional success through the exploration of a topic or issue. One of the three Signature Outcomes for the new model is Civic and Community Engagement, and students must take at least one course that includes such engagement.
- New students to SU are offered the opportunity to live on campus in one of our Living Learning Communities where students with common interests live together, share courses with out-of-class experiential learning experiences, have a faculty mentor to encourage them in and out of class, and participate in activities designed to bring the community theme to life. Current LLCs include:
 - Biomedical Science
 - Communication

- SU's Career Connections database connects students

 and alumni with internships, part-time and full-time jobs, workshops, job fairs and other useful resources to prepare for a successful career.
- Perdue School of Business students complete an Applied Business Learning Experience (ABLE) internship so they can gain relevant experience in their major and to give them valuable on-the-job experience that sets them apart once they enter the workforce.
- Even before it became part of the new General Education model, many majors required – and most encouraged – students to complete an experiential learning project or internship to earn their degree, from teaching interns in our area schools to nursing clinical practicums to history internships exploring our region's rich past.

- SU's Fraud Program in the Accounting and Legal Studies Program earned a \$2.6 million federal grant to partner with area law enforcement and prosecutors to curb elder fraud. Fraud student gain valuable experiential learning through the program's internship program.
- For over 25 years, SU's AmeriCorps program ShoreCorps – places hundreds of students with dozens of service sites across the Eastern Shore. These sites enhance the local sectors of the arts, community support, education, environment, health education, homelessness, volunteer management and youth development. In 2021, ShoreCorps awarded more than \$250,000 in education money to its 147 student participants.
- SU's Institute for Public Affairs and Civic Engagement's (PACE) Presidential Citizen Scholars Program is a civic engagement program for SU students, with recent projects including assisting with English as a Second Language (ESL) classes for community members in a partnership with Wor-Wic Community College, music lessons for kids at the Newton Street Community Center, art events for kids and families, and a potential revival of the City's trolley circuit to provide greater access to transportation for community members.
- SU sends students every year to present at the National Conference on Undergraduate Research (NCUR) and has twice hosted this prestigious event.
- The Office of Undergraduate Research and Creative Activity (OURCA) supports faculty-student mentorship and scholarship through preparing, conducting and presenting original research and creative works. Its programs include:
 - SU Student Research Conference: This annual showcase of student work has been active for over 20 years.
 - SU Summer Research: Every summer, students across disciplines work with faculty mentors on research projects ranging from harmonic progressions in music to co-nesting patterns of southern flying squirrels. They then present their projects at an annual showcase event.
 - Undergraduate Research Fellows: These student ambassadors have been involved in the research and creative works development at the University and act as mentors who are new to the process.
 - Posters on the Bay: Annually, approximately 30 SU students travel to Annapolis to interact with state legislators and other state leaders by sharing their research and highlighting the important work being done at the University.
