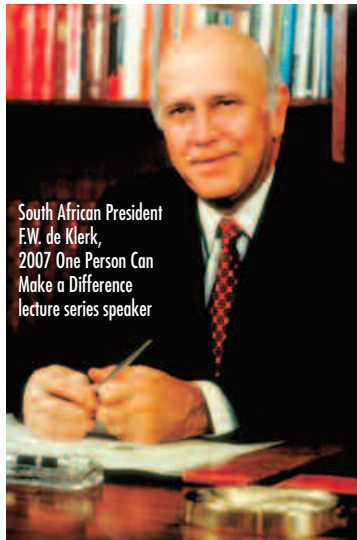

The Department of Conflict Analysis and Dispute Resolution (CADR) offers a major and minor in conflict analysis and dispute resolution, and will offer a Master of Arts beginning fall 2009.

The Bachelor of Arts in conflict analysis and dispute resolution has been named a Maryland 'Program of Distinction.' The department offers students a multidisciplinary, practical and applied approach to teaching and training. The CADR program balances theories and research in conflict and conflict resolution with real-world, practical applications. Students can focus on various types of conflict, including interpersonal, group, international, environmental and cross-cultural conflicts.
