Policies

1. Refer to the SU catalog for approved general education courses.
2. Requirements may not equal 120 credit hours. Students must register for additional electives to complete 120 credits required for graduation.
3. All graduates must have a minimum of 30 credits of 300/400 level courses with “C” grade or above; at least 15 of those credits must be taken at SU.
4. Students must have a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.0 for graduation.
5. Students must complete at least 30 credits hours by direct classroom instruction and/or laboratory experience.
6. Students must take 30 of the last 37 credit hours at SU.
7. Students should consult the degree progress report in GullNet for information on their academic progress.
8. It is the student’s responsibility to satisfy graduation requirements. Please refer to the SU catalog for detailed major requirements.
9. Students must apply online for graduation by Nov. 15 for May and May 15 for December.

Major Policies and Requirements:

Salisbury University offers a major in Interdisciplinary Studies leading to the Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Science. The major accommodates students who wish to develop programs of study in two or more disciplines or create a major in an area of study not offered by any traditional major at SU. This program allows students to create an individual and flexible track that is best suited to their interests or career goals. Most importantly, this program gives students the opportunity to integrate information across disciplines to help gain a more complete understanding of the chosen area of study.

Students wishing to major in Interdisciplinary Studies Individually Designed Track must submit an IDIS Proposal Form to the Interdisciplinary Studies Coordinator for approval in order to officially change to the Interdisciplinary Studies major. Students are required to write a goal statement to show a rationale for the cohesion of the areas of study and describe any potential career goals suitable for the program proposal. The program proposals should list any lower-division prerequisites to the courses chosen for the Interdisciplinary Studies major and note the possible 300/400 level courses being used to complete the Interdisciplinary Studies major. The Interdisciplinary Studies Individual Track major policies and requirement include:

1. Students must complete a minimum of 30 semester hours in 300/400-level courses from two or three approved academic disciplines with grades of C or better.
2. Students must complete IDIS 330: Interdisciplinary Research Seminar with a grade of C or better as part of their approved program.
3. Students are responsible for completing all prerequisite courses required for the courses chosen for their IDIS major and must list the course prerequisites on the program proposal.
4. The program proposal must include a rationale for the cohesion of the areas of study and describe any potential career goals suitable for the program proposal.
5. Upper-division courses (300/400 level) completed prior to receiving program approval may or may not be used for the IDIS major, and no more than 18 such credits may be credited toward the major.
6. At least 15 credits must be taken in residence – at Salisbury University.
7. No more than two of the courses used to meet the IDIS major may be used to meet minor or other major requirements.
8. Any deviation from an approved program must be approved in writing by the IDIS Coordinator.
