TOWERS-MILLS SCHOLARSHIP

Beginning in fall 2012, Salisbury University's first doctoral program, the Doctor of Nursing Practice (D.N.P.), begins. The initial course offerings will be in a cohort-style and are designed for individuals who are already master's-prepared nurse practitioners, clinical nurse specialists, midwives or nurse anesthetists. "A Doctor of Nursing Practice aligns with Salisbury University's mission to provide graduate education for professional programs and meet the workforce needs of the State and region," said Dr. Lisa Seldomridge, chair of the Nursing Department.

Several students will benefit not only from the addition of this new program, but also from the generosity of an alumni couple. This past year, Wayne '63 and Donna Sheets '65 Towers established their second scholarship with the Salisbury University Foundation, Inc. – this time in memory of Wayne's late aunt Meta Mildred Mills. Mills, a veteran of the United States Air Force (USAF) Nurse Corps, was named Head Nurse for the United States Astronaut Program in 1963. Working her way through the military ranks, Colonel Mills exemplified the nursing profession. "Aunt Meta was a very unique and special person," shared Towers. "From my earliest memories of her, she always placed others before herself. As a graduate of Cambridge, MD, hospital's nursing program, she continued her service in the field of nursing by entering the USAF in 1950. Twenty-five years later, Colonel Meta Mills retired. Meta was recognized by the USAF time after time for her outstanding performance. In our small way, we hope we can also recognize her life and the way she lived it by establishing this scholarship in her memory."

Towers hopes that the enthusiasm and integrity committed to the nursing profession by his aunt will live on in the students of this new program through the Colonel Meta M. Mills Nursing Scholarship.
