Thursday, October 3 "The Rebel Is on Thy Shore—The Maryland Campaign of 1862" Lecture

Maryland Humanities Council Speakers Bureau Member Thomas G. Clemens will discuss the political and military dilemmas facing the Union and Confederate governments in the summer of 1862 and the powerful effects of the Maryland campaign on the direction of the Civil War. This event will be held in the Wicomico Room of SU's Guerrieri University Center and is free and open to the public.

Ainsworth Addition

Over the years, Somerset County resident, Freedom Ainsworth, has donated a number of items of historical interest to the Nabb Research Center including many documents related to Eastern Shore architecture. The Ainsworth family recently added a number of items to this collection, including several ledgers, day books, fee books and journals as well as pottery shards, photographs and other Somerset County materials.

The bulk of the addition focuses on life in and around Beckford, an early 18th century home in Princess Anne. One of the most interesting items in the donation is the ledger of the Brig *Peggy*, an 18th century merchant ship. In 1766 during a voyage to the island of Antigua, the *Peggy* delivered items such as planks, staves, tobacco, flour, *pease*, bread, fine bread, Indian corn, 5 dozen ducks and 6 geese. The vessel returned to Somerset County loaded with 836 gallons of rum, over 300 casks of sugar, 4 hogsheads of molasses and 8 barrels of limes. The *Peggy* was owned by Levin Gale and Henry Jackson and Henry Liddell was the Master of the Brig.

Colona was the Justice of the Peace in Princess Anne from 1902-1904.

Library of Dr. John B. Bell Donated to Nabb Center

The Nabb Research Center extends its sincere thanks to Paul Bell who recently donated in excess of 150 volumes related to Delmarva history to the Nabb Research Center's holdings. Mr. Bell's father, the late Dr. John B. Bell, was an avid family historian who had acquired an extensive genealogical library. Most of Dr. Bell's genealogical research focused on the Eastern Shore of Virginia. He was the author of two books, *Northampton County Tithables, 1662-1677* and *Northampton County Tithables, 1720-1769*. Dr. Bell also authored a monograph on the Northampton Protest of 1652, which is on file in the Eastern Shore Public Library in Accomack, VA. The Bell volumes will be accessioned and added to the Center's holding throughout this summer.
