## New Morris Donation

Dr. and Mrs. Albert Morris of Salisbury recently donated several beautiful heirloom family coverlets to the Nabb Research Center's archival collections. The textiles were created by Worcester County resident Rosa Tilghman Morris, Dr. Morris' grandmother. Carefully hand-woven in yarn to form intricate patterns, these coverlets date to the early 20th century. The donation includes coverlets in a number of colors and patterns, including the Whig Rose, Honeycomb & Diamond, Double Vision, Square & Stripe, Double Diamond Lozenge & Square and Chariot Wheels. Over the past year, the Morris' have generously donated a number of books and other items to the Center's holdings. These coverlets will be added to the Nabb Research Center's growing collection of textiles and other material culture items. As techniques for creating this type of textile folk art are lost, the Nabb Research Center is pleased to have a role in preserving this part of Delmarva's heritage.

## Student Prize Winner Announced For Fall Semester

Marc R. Garlock is the winner of the Miles-Stevenson Student Prize for the fall semester. Established by Marelyn Zipser in honor of Roger Atwood Miles and Arintha May Stevenson, this award is given each semester for outstanding historical research by an SU student enrolled in History 330. A native of Syracuse, NY, Garlock received his bachelor of arts degree in psychology from SU in 1995. After graduation he worked in Lexington, KY, for seven years before returning to SU this year to pursue a second B.A. in history and secondary education. Garlock hopes to become a high school history/political science teacher. In his "free" time, he works as a substitute teacher in Worcester County. Garlock's winning paper is a biographical sketch of 17th century Somerset County resident Miles Gray. Gray was active in Accomack and Somerset counties from about 1660 until his death in 1717. Garlock's biography of Miles Gray will be published in the members' edition of the *Shoreline* newsletter in March 2003.
