## Collection Spotlight: Glass Plate Negatives

The above image is from a Brown glass plate negative. The location and exact date of the homes in this image is unknown. However, glass plate negatives were used from about 1851 to 1920. August's Spotlight on Collections is devoted to collodion glass plate negatives from photographer E. I. Brown. The pictures were donated in June by Robert S. Withey in memory of his father, C. Robert Withey, who recently passed away. Withey was a member of the Wicomico Historical Society and Somerset County Historical Society. To mark his passing, the Nabb Center would like to honor the restorative work he accomplished in our community – chiefly Bounds Lott and Teackle Mansion.

The glass plate negatives from the Brown Collection are a great example of early photographic techniques. There were two basic types of glass plate negatives – collodion wet plate and gelatin dry plate. The collodion process, invented in England in 1851 by Frederick Scott Archer, used a light-sensitive glass plate prepared just before exposure. The gelatin dry plate process replaced the collodion process because dry plates could be prepared long before exposure. As a result,

professional photographers were able to travel with fewer supplies and amateurs were able to take their own pictures. In the 1880s Kodak introduced cameras, which included their own film, similar to the disposable cameras used today. Once the film was used, the photographer sent the camera back to Kodak where the pictures were developed and returned to the buyer with new film loaded.

The Nabb Center was able to have all the glass plate negatives donated by Withey digitally captured. The scanned images are positives and can be printed. Today's technology allows us to recapture images from the past. As mentioned last month, photos are always wonderful additions to the archives, but more so when the subjects are identified. To learn more about how to care for, properly identify, house and possibly scan your own photographs, be sure to attend the Nabb Center's Photo Preservation Workshop on Sept. 9.
