

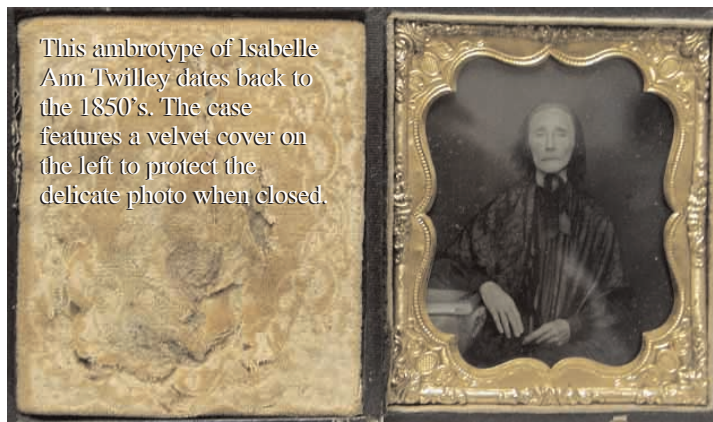

## Nabb Center Acquires Ambrotype Photograph

This month's Spotlight on Collections focuses a particular item received from Elizabeth Short Cissel of Baltimore. Last summer, Cissel donated many items regarding the Short side of her family. Included in this donation is a beautifully framed portrait. This photograph appears to be an ambrotype. Ambrotypes, popular in the 1850's, are collodion glass-plate negatives that appear as positives when viewed against a dark surface. Cissel has identified this image as Isabella Ann Twilley. Unlike most other types of photography, the ambrotype is on a glass support, making it extremely fragile. To combat destruction, ambrotypes are generally found in cases. Isabel's portrait is in a closeable case decorated with a golden metal, probably pinchbeck, and lined with velvet.

Photographic images are always wonderful additions to the archives, but more so when the subjects are identified.

Often we don't take the time to label our own photographs, thinking we will definitely know the subjects 10 or 20 years down the road. Although the process is tedious and time consuming, identifying all the people, places and events in today's photographs will be more helpful than we can imagine for future researchers. Fortunately, the identification of Isabella Ann

Twilley was passed down with her portrait making it even more beneficial to Nabb Center patrons.

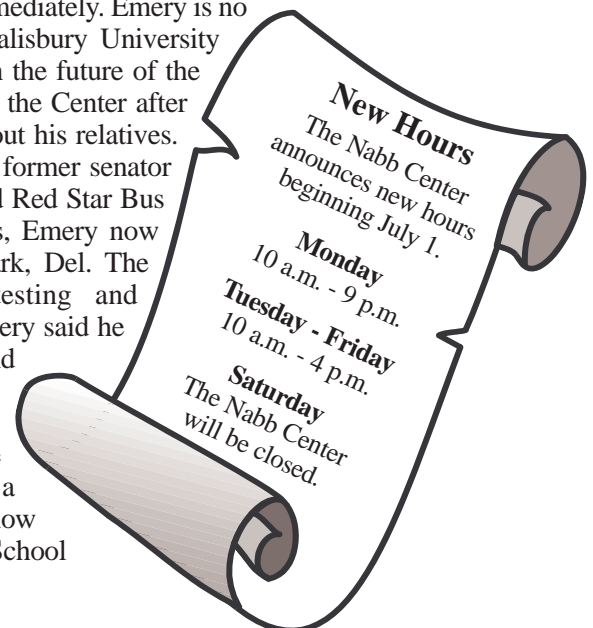
## Nabb Research Center Welcomes New Board Member

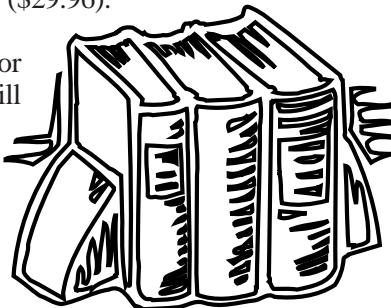
*Accounts of Lord Baltimore's Revenue from 1731-1761* (\$14).
