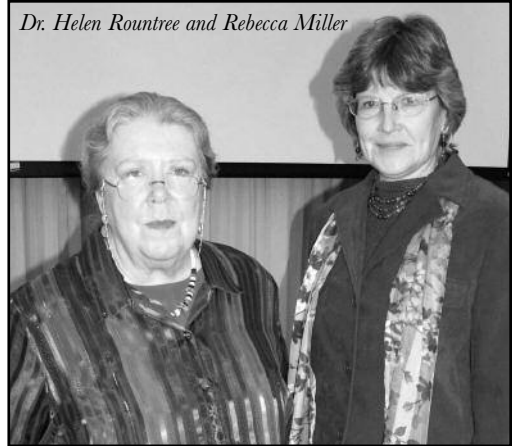
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Rountree Lecture Well Received

Rountree spoke extensively on how Native Americans utilized their natural resources along the rivers of the Eastern Shore and at the same time cultivated a balanced relationship with the environment. Rountree also highlighted Indian fishing, farming, foraging and hunting and the unique way in which certain Eastern Shore Indians organized their towns. She also commented on the vital role women played in finding ideal land for their families. After Rountree's lecture, the audience participated in a question-and-answer session followed by a catered reception. Three Ships Came Sailing In ... By James Edward Jensen

During the Colonial period many ships came through the waters of Somerset County, MD. Among the numerous land records one can find the advertisements for these ships listing their commanders and the rate at which they took tobacco freight to England. Between 1718 and 1751 the rates varied from around 7 to 16 pounds sterling per ton of tobacco, but from 1747 to 1750 the rate dropped sharply from a high of 16 to a mere 7 pounds sterling, reflecting the unstable nature of this cash crop. The ships were commanded by local entrepreneurs like John Coward, Francis Hayward, Capt. William Hooper, Roger Kellet, Henry Lowes, James Lucas and Capt. William Murray, most of whom could boast inventories amounting to over a thousand pounds sterling. These often overlooked advertisements name the rivers where the ships lay at anchor, such as the Nanticoke, Wicomico, Manokin and Pocomoke, as well as the individuals to whom the shipments were consigned—the latter consisting of rich merchants back in England. The Eastern Shore was definitely active in the tobacco trade and this in turn allowed Somerset and her sister counties to profit from their close ties to the economics of the English Empire. ☺
