Ossuary Seminar

In April the Nabb Center, Salisbury University and the Maryland Commission on Indian Affairs sponsored a seminar featuring prominent anthropologists, archeologists, Eastern Shore chiefs and other representatives of the Native community. The discussion centered on the ossuary that was discovered at Harbor Point (near Salisbury) the previous year. The site dates to c. 1400-1650 and contained at least 35 individuals with 14 identified as men and 13 as women. Dr. Elizabeth Ragan stated "I was really peripheral with all of the work," and that her first reaction was one of "consternation." "We are seekers of knowledge," said Dr. Edward Otter who gave a background talk on ossuaries in general. Physical Anthropologist Dana Kollmann provided forensic evidence and spoke about the findings she made from the remains she examined in March 2004. Kollmann confirmed the site was Native American and that the average age of the subjects was 30.07. (Only a few lived past 50 and the women lived an average of six years longer than men.) Kollmann stated that it was a secondary burial, but that she saw "no marks of intentional defleshing." Dr. Richard Hughes of the Maryland Historical Trust gave a presentation written by Dr. Virginia Busby on the cultural diversity of the area Native population in the 17th and 18th centuries. There was a panel discussion with Gina Hamblin, Chief Sewell Winterhawk Fitzhugh, Chief Medicine Cat, Chief Rudy Hall and his wife, and Mary Hope Billings. The day ended with participants having learned a lot about alternate views, where Chief Winterhawk stated, "my grandmother said the only good archeologist is a dead archeologist," and after laughter in the audience, he said he was pleased that everyone was able to do what they wanted while no one group was excluded.
