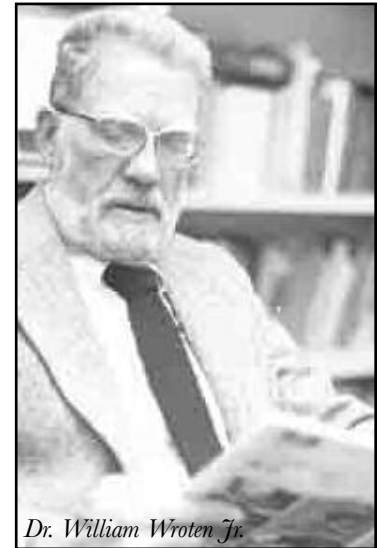
Student Intern

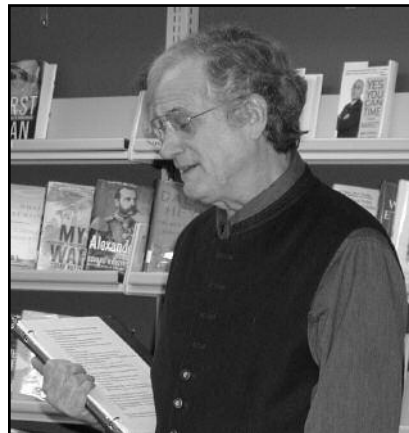


"We're History... Without You"

Family History Workshop

On Saturday, September 9, the Nabb Research Center hosts a Family History Workshop as a fund raiser for the center. This event is presented by Salisbury University professors and Nabb Research Center board members Dr. Ray Thompson and Dr. Clara Small. Topics covered include: how to start your family research, what sources to examine for genealogical study, how to take an oral history, special research techniques for African-American researchers and the interpretation of Colonial handwriting. The workshop also allows time for a "hands-on" work session. The cost of the workshop is \$50 per person / \$40 for students and members of the Nabb Research Center.

The workshop is from 10 a.m.-3 p.m. with a one-hour break for lunch.
