Discovering Salisbury's Fire Department History

Assistant Chief Bryan Records of the Salisbury Fire Department is a frequent visitor to the Nabb Research Center these days. Records is working to create a historical exhibit for the new fire station scheduled to open within the next 14 months. The exhibit will feature fire equipment from the late 19th century as well as a collection of photographs. Records has been using the Nabb Research Center's Fred A. Grier Collection to help fill in some gaps in the Salisbury Fire Department record. The center's collection of photographs helped to explain a lot of mysteries and rumors within the Salisbury Fire Department's history. Chiefly among them is the existence of a second Salisbury fire boat from the

turn of the 20th century. The Grier Collection has the only known photograph of three fire-boats. The first time the chief saw the trove of photos, he told Director Becky Miller, "It's like I've won a million dollars."

Salisbury School Visits Nabb

You may find a slightly younger crowd engaged in study at the Nabb Research Center these days—and we are not talking about the college students. Dan Pavese, a graduate of Salisbury University, teaches AP U.S. History for the Salisbury School. He was introduced to the Nabb Research Center as a student at SU. Remembering the wealth of information housed at the center, he felt it would be of excellent use to his students. Pavese's class is currently working on a project involving the Civil War and slavery. They are investigating the period through the eyes of those who lived through it. Pavese's students are using diaries, journals and personal interviews to write research papers and to use as background information for other projects. He plans to bring his class to the Nabb Research Center throughout the spring to continue exploring American history through primary resources. ☺

Women's History Month Lecture

Celebrating Women's History Month, on Thursday, March 15, 2007 at 3:30 p.m., Dr. Sarah Case, assistant professor, U.S. women's history, and director, gender studies program at Salisbury University, presents a lecture titled "Respectability and Southern Women's Education, 1880-1920" at the Nabb Research Center. The Lucy Cobb Institute of Athens and the Spelman Seminary of Atlanta, two Georgia schools directed and staffed by women, demonstrate the centrality of respectability to the identities of women, white and black, in the postwar South. The schools, one educating daughters of the southern white elite, the other attended by the daughters of former slaves, may appear to have little in common, but both were led by female faculty who faced the challenge of readying young women for the new demands of urban public life. Learn how these instructors taught principles of modesty and respectability as protection against accusations of immorality for young women venturing into the public sphere: the new feminine ideal. The lecture is free and open to the public at the Nabb Research Center in Room 190 of the East Campus Complex of Salisbury University.
