WHAT'S OLD IS NEW! GREETINGS FROM THE CHAIR

Greetings from a familiar face! No, you're not reading an old newsletter—it is 2009, and I have returned to the position of department chair. The 2008-2009 academic year has been a landmark year for the Department of Nursing with numerous accomplishments. None of these would be possible without the outstanding leadership of former chair Dr. Susan Battistoni, former associate chair Dr. Thea McDowell and former director of Graduate and Second-Degree Programs Dr. Karin Johnson. Although they have stepped away from their administrative positions, each plays a key role in our continued success as they return to full-time teaching. Please join me in thanking them for their collective administrative service of over 20 years.

In addition to the usual business of teaching undergraduate and graduate students, we reached several other important milestones.

Among the highlights:

- Salisbury University graduates posted the highest NCLEX-RN pass rate for all bachelor's degree programs in the state of Maryland with a pass rate of 95.45 percent.
- The undergraduate and graduate programs received re-accreditation by the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education for the maximum period, 10 years.
- Three faculty completed doctoral degrees at the University of Maryland, Baltimore. Drs. Laurie Rockelli, Michele Bracken and Rita Nutt, raising the percentage of doctorally-prepared tenure track faculty in the department to an all-time high of 87.5 percent. Dr. Rita Nutt is the first faculty member to hold the new D.N.P. (Doctor of Nursing Practice) credential.
- 2009 marks the 30th anniversary of graduating students with a Bachelor of Science in Nursing. With its roots in the three-year Peninsula General Hospital School of Nursing, early collaborations between then Salisbury State College and PGH allowed for a natural transition to baccalaureate education for nurses. Over 100 people attend our gala, held May 9, 2009.
- The department has been named a recipient of eight \$10,000 scholarships from the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, New Careers in Nursing Program. This program aims to increase the number of graduates of accelerated second-bachelor's degree from under-

represented and economically disadvantaged groups. Students enrolled in this program typically graduate in three semesters. As a result of this scholarship program, which begins in fall 2009, Salisbury University will increase enrollment in its accelerated second-bachelor's program to 24 students.

- Dr. Karen Badros and Dr. Susan Battistoni received the Lucy Tull Distinguished Faculty Award for excellence in nursing education and commitment to regional healthcare.
- Two new graduate nursing tracks were launched in fall 2008 as outcomes of a \$261,000 Maryland Higher Education Commission Nurse Support Program grant written by Dr. Karen Johnson and Dr. Susan Battistoni. The R.N. to Master's Program provides the RN wishing to have a graduate nursing degree with a 9-12 credit efficiency over the more traditional route where the B.S. and M.S. in nursing are pursued separately. The Clinical Nurse Educator Track prepares graduate nurses for positions as clinical faculty in colleges/universities or health care settings. Graduates of this track are eligible to take the National League for Nursing (NLN) Certified Nurse Educator (CNE) exam.
- Three new clinical faculty positions will be developed in collaboration with Peninsula Regional Medical Center and Atlantic General Hospital as the result of a \$635,601 grant from the Maryland Higher Education Commission Nurse Support Program. This three-year project, directed by Dr. Lisa Seldomridge, will provide mentorship for expert nurse clinicians as they transition to clinical nursing faculty positions. As a new model for the Eastern Shore of Maryland, this initiative aims to address the shortage of qualified clinical nursing faculty.

- Updates on the 2 Gs—Genetics and Gerontology:
 - Genetics workshops were held in April for faculty and students to learn more about genetics, genomics and what practicing nurses need to know about both. Led by Dr. Sharon Olsen from Johns Hopkins University, the faculty engaged in lively discussions about ways to update content and assignments to prepare B.S. and M.S. graduates for contemporary nursing practice.
 - Gerontology infusion in the undergraduate curriculum is the focus for 2009-2010, led by Drs. Mary DiBartolo and Vonnie Brown after attendance at the prestigious Harford Institute for Gerontology in San Diego, CA. As the U.S. population ages, tomorrow's nurses will need even more specialized education to provide the best care possible. SU intends to be at the forefront of providing that education.
- Familiar faces in new roles include Dr. Debra Webster, who assumed the position of associate chair in January 2009, and Dr. Molly Parsons, who began July 2009 as the new director of Graduate and Second-degree Programs. In addition, Dr. William Campbell has expanded his role in advising RN students.
- New faces in the department include Ms. Jaimi Hall (SU, 1995) who returns for her second year as a full-time non-tenure track faculty teaching and supervising clinical experiences in maternal/newborn care and Ms. Carmel Boger, Administrative Assistant for the Graduate and Second-Degree programs.
- New faces in the Henson School of Science and Technology include Dr. Karen Olmstead who began as dean July 1, 2008. A biologist by education, Dr. Olmstead made two clinical site visits (with Dr. Laurie Rockelli in psych and Professor Katie Simmons, in ICU stepdown) so she could understand the business of what we do.

West Goes East: SU in China

In May 2009, a group of SU nursing students, faculty and alumni and two Thomas Jefferson University nursing students traveled to China to study Traditional Chinese Medicine (TCM) and visit some of that country's wonders. The group included faculty members Dr. Dorothea McDowell and Professor Katie Hinderer, alumnae and graduate student Aaron Sebach, alumni Kortni Pedlow and Diana Woodard, and current SU students Katherine Bernoske, Jennifer Hamm and Orlett Haskett.

While in China the group had opportunities to be educated in TCM, as well as, see it in practice at a TCM hospital. While in Jingzhou City, Hubei, McDowell and Hinderer presented talks on "Prevention of Healthcare Acquired Infections" and "Critical Care Nursing in the United States" to the Academy of Jingzhou Nurses. Alumni Kortni Pedlow and Aaron Sebach presented talks on "Care of the Acute MI Patient" and "Trauma Nursing" to students of the Medical School of Yangtze University.

Other highlights of the trip included visiting the Three Gorges Dam in Xichang, Tiananmen Square, the Forbidden City, the Summer Palace and the Great Wall. Most of the group members conquered the use of chop sticks and came home with stories to tell of taxi rides, pedestrian accident near misses, night life in Beijing and riding a rip line down from the Great Wall.

McDowell plans to offer a short-term study abroad trip to China every other summer.
