Dr. Clark has well documented experience mentoring students and faculty (including as co-director of OURCA); leading and participating in faculty development groups; serving on a national council related to high-impact practices (Council on Undergraduate Research); and serving as co-PI on a NSF-funded collaboration across five USM institutions

- Elementary Education major Sandes Saintil and his mentor at Prince Street Elementary School (Alyssa Bollinger) were recently recognized by the American Association of Colleges of Teacher Education with the **Diversified Workforce Teacher Exemplar Award**.
- May 2021 Commencement Planning: We are currently planning virtual graduation exercises by school and college with a separate event for graduate students. We are concurrently planning an in-person component to be held in Sea Gull Stadium that would allow graduates to be individually recognized as they walk across a stage. Attendance at the in-person event would be limited and would be live-streamed for families, friends, and the University community to cheer on the degree recipients. - Salisbury University will continue our tradition of supporting student research and creative scholarship by showcasing their work at the Salisbury University Student Research Conference (SUSRC). - The Salisbury University Foundation invites applications from fulltime SU faculty and staff for their **professional development grant program**. See the email sent from Amy Waters on Feb. 3 for more information.
- As noted in the email from Todd Smith (Web Communications Manager) sent on 2/12/21, there is a <u>new work request system</u> for the Web Office for website work, event registrations, campus TV messaging and other communications.
- Captioning is now available for Zoom meetings (see Captioning button on bottom of the Zoom screen). The captioning is viewable to the users clicking on the button, but not to all users. For captioning for courses, please follow the process described at this site. Please note, the captioning service (Rev.com) is indicated in the upper-left corner (can be confused with meeting recording indicator).
- The University has acquired a campus-wide license for NameCoach which allows students and other members of the campus community to record their names in an audio file which can then be accessed by others to learn name pronunciation. User info (for both recording and listening to audio files) is forthcoming. In addition to this functionality being loaded into MyClasses, audiofiles can also be added to emails and other communications. Thanks

- Please consider reminding students in your classes to complete their assigned **Diversity**, **Equity and Inclusion Training for Students**. Students are receiving weekly reminders that include the log-in or they can access the training from their GullNet account. Currently, less than 1500 students have completed this valuable training, so we appreciate your endorsement and encouragement.
- The **Safe Spaces Workshop** is designed to help people reduce the often unwelcoming and even hostile environments in which Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender (LGBT+) people navigate in their daily lives. <u>Click here</u> to register for the Safe Space Workshop on March 29th from 3:00-5:00.
- As Advising ramps up, don't forget the helpful email from Melissa Boog (sent on 2/15) that describes how to send emails to targeted groups of students through Navigate.
- Should you be into long-range planning, our academic calendars for the next several years are attached in a handy document.

COVID-19 Information on the COVID-19 website is constantly being updated, so please regularly check that. As noted in the email from Human Resources sent on 2/18/21, we are increasing surveillance efforts at a time when COVID-19-compliance fatigue and new variants are a concern. Consistent with the guidance from the USM, protocols developed by the University Health Team and in consultation with local and state health officials, we will be increasing our testing efforts. Beginning today, all SU faculty and staff who are on campus regularly (more than twice per month) must take an SU-administered COVID-19 rapid test at least every 14 days to maintain access to campus buildings. Faculty and staff must take their first test between March 1 and 14, regardless of the date of their last PCR test, and schedule their second test at least 10 days after their first. Appointment signups are available online. This will replace the former 30-day testing requirement for most employees.

Campus community members who are considered at high-risk or who live with those who are should feel free to contact Campus Health at campushealth@salisbury.edu or 410-677-0006 for assistance with parking or scheduling a testing time.
