- **Provost search** candidates are expected to be here the last week of March; open sessions will be held for each (information forthcoming).
- Our <u>Middle States Re-Accreditation</u> process is well underway. **Kara Raab** (AVP for Planning & Assessment) and Jessica Clark (Assistant Provost for Faculty Success) have worked with the <u>Steering Committee</u> on a draft self-study design plan. Dr. Sean McKitrick, our Middle States liaison, will be on campus on March 28 and will hold an open session about the process.

And thanks to SU's Faculty Awards & Recognition Committee (chaired by **Randy Groth**, Secondary & Physical Education) for their great work with the award nominees.

- In other big news, Salisbury University was named **the Top Producer of Fulbright Students in the nation** (Masters-level institutions) and is the top producer in the USM! This is a tremendous testament to the quality and commitment of our students, the dedication and skill of **Kristen Walton** and her team in the <u>Nationally Competitive Fellowships Office</u>, and all of the faculty and staff mentors of student and alumni applicants. What a tremendous recognition of the outstanding work done at Salisbury University.
- And speaking of Fulbright, **Art Lembo** (Geography & Geosciences) recently was notified that he has been named a Fulbright Scholar to South Korea for the Fall, 2023 semester. This appointment will not only be professionally enriching, but will also build on the Lembo family's connections to South Korea (SU Alumna Emily Lembo was a Fulbright Student (2014) and now lives in South Korea and SU junior Katie Lembo studying there this semester).
- Big shout out to everyone who has worked so hard on new and existing courses for our new General Education curriculum which will go into effect in Fall 2024. As of March 1, we have 184

courses submitted for review and 23 approved through the process. This has been a tremendous lift for faculty and academic departments as well as the General Education Oversight Committee (led by **Jennifer Nyland** (Biological Sciences)), its subcommittees, Curriculum Specialist **Jennifer Ellis** and VPAA **Melissa Boog** (Academic Affairs), and the UCC (led by **Amanda Hill** (Social Work)). - Nearly 30 students presented their work in Annapolis on 2/23/23 at <u>Posters on the Bay</u>. Governor Moore was a special guest and spoke with each of the students about their research. My sincere thanks to the students and their faculty mentors for their great work. Thanks also to **Rhy Bemis** (Psychology), the entire <u>OURCA</u> team, and **Eli Modlin** and others in the President's Office for organizing such a wonderful celebration
- My appreciation to Meghan East (Medical Laboratory Sciences), the Faculty Development Committee, CAFE, Melissa Thomas and the ID&D team, and all the presenters at our 13th Annual Teaching & Learning Conference. It was great to be back in person for this event which featured 24 engaging sessions, including an inspiring keynote by Kristen Walton, SU's 2022 Distinguished Faculty Award winner. - On 2/18/23, the SU Vex Robotics Club hosted competitions for high school and college students. It was an exciting weekend with fierce competition. My thanks to **Giulia Franchi** (Computer Science), SU Vex Robotics Club, and the many faculty in the departments of Computer Science and Mathematical Sciences that made this event possible.
- Blake Harris (Music, Theatre & Dance) was awarded two grants for his Chattanooga, TN-based professional theatre company, <u>Obvious Dad</u>. They received a \$4,000 grant from Mark Making and a \$10,000 grant from ArtsBuild for their upcoming summer season. Well done, Blake.
