Monday-Friday, July 29-August 2

9 a.m.-4 p.m. – Lunch Provided in the Commons

Grades 9-12

Location: SU Campus

Cost: \$75

This academy provides enrichment activities designed to prepare high school students with the skills they need to smoothly transition to college or the workplace after they graduate from high school. Students develop skills in choosing a career path, goal setting, time management, study skills, public speaking, test taking, critical thinking, problem-solving and more. Students in this academy create vision boards that they will share with their families and friends on the last day.

Throughout the week, students read legends from the Eastern Shore, conduct research at the Nabb Center and write their own SU campus stories based on the materials they find. At the end of the week, they will lead their tour of the SU campus during which they will tell their stories to the public.

















Philosophy Academy

Cost: \$75

Through a rigorous seminar-like experience, students are introduced to the discipline of philosophy and work to develop their critical thinking skills in preparation for college.

















World Languages & Culture Academy

Monday-Friday, July 8-12

1-5 p.m. (Lunch Is Not Provided)

Grades 6-8

Location: SU Campus

Cost: \$200

Through an immersion in the French and Spanish languages, this academy encourages students to develop an interest in languages and a curiosity for diverse cultures and people. Each day, they explore a new theme (food, holidays, fashion, famous people and monuments). Students engage in hands-on activities such as games, calligraphy, cooking, arts and crafts, and movies. The academy dedicates two days for the Spanish language and two days for the French language. On the last day of the academy, the students will share with their families what they have learned.

















Learning Russian Through Acting Academy

Cost: \$400

Are you thinking about a career in international relations, national security, diplomacy, economics, or linguistics? Are you a creative performer who loves the theatre? Then, this academy is for you! This academy gives students the unique and valuable opportunity to learn Russian through the fun and engaging process of acting. Throughout the week, students learn and practice Russian words, phrases and expressions while working on a Russian-language play that they will present at the end of the week. The students learn a new language in a relaxed, creative and fun environment and work on their leadership, team building and interpersonal skills, all of which are crucial to their success in college and the workplace.

















Craft Time Designs

Cost: \$400

This creative, full-day academy offers different options of crafting like painting by numbers, creating clay animals, making houses out of materials found on nature walks, tie-dye, watercolor painting with salt and learning how to fix simple meals!

















Fun with Art Academy

Monday-Friday, June 24-28 OR July 22-26

9 a.m.-4 p.m. - Lunch Provided in the Commons

Grades K to 3

Location: SU Campus

Cost: \$400

This academy allows students to gain knowledge of various artists to experiment and develop skills in multiple methods of art processes to demonstrate quality craftsmanship. The students learn about a different artist and a different theme each day! Abstract painting, collages, splatter painting, cloud dough, salt painting, bubble painting and tie-dye are just some of the techniques the students learn.

















Games Academy

Cost: \$200

Students explore various aspects of game creation. They create their own rules, cards, characters and gameboards. Students work in groups to play and test their creations and learn how game mechanics work. They learn team-building skills with their peers.

















Comics Academy

Students use techniques such as drawing, painting, collage and creative writing to tell a story in visual form.

















Art & Nature Academy

Grades 1-5

Location: SU Campus

Cost: \$200

Exploration and discovery on Salisbury University's beautiful campus are central to the art-making techniques students explore. Students use a wide variety of mediums to express their connection with nature. Prints, pressings and paintings are used to replicate natural settings uniquely. The creation of birdhouses, wind-catchers, rock art and sun prints connect each student's imagination with the outdoor world around them.

















Mixed-Media Art Academy

Grades 1-5

Location: SU Campus

Cost: \$200

Get ready to mix things up! Students explore a myriad of art-making techniques through the combination of painting, drawing, collage, sculpture, fibers and more. Students express their personalities through unique artworks created in non-traditional ways. Working in groups, the students collaborate and discover new ways to create. This academy will be in a studio as well as outdoors on SU's beautiful campus.

















Orchestra Academy

Monday- Friday, July 15-19

9 a.m.-Noon (Lunch Provided at Noon in the Commons; Pick-Up at 1 p.m.)

Grades 6-12

Location: SU Campus

Cost: \$200

Students perform in an orchestra and small ensembles in a supportive and fun environment. They have an opportunity to improve their rhythm and aural skills through sessions in a percussion studio and piano lab.

Prerequisite: Students must provide their own instruments and have at least two years of lessons and playing experience.

















Summer STEAM Academy

Grades 3-5

Location: SU Campus

Cost: \$400

This exciting academy focuses on STEAM (science, technology, engineering, arts and mathematics) activities during the week. Each day, students engage in two STEAM activities that will encourage them to use their critical thinking, creativity, communication and collaboration skills. This academy helps build their confidence and their observation skills.

Monday-Friday


Grades 3-5: July 8-12 | Grades 6-8: July 29-August 2

9 a.m.-Noon - Lunch Provided in the Commons

Location: SU Campus

Cost: \$200

This academy focuses on maker activities that allow students to explore concepts in various subject areas such as math, art and science. Additionally, they build a maker mindset that can be applied across all disciplines. Students use Strawbees, a hands-on exploration kit to build objects to test ideas and demonstrate their understanding of maker concepts.

















Henson School of Science & Technology – **Intensive Academy**

Monday-Friday, (Two Weeks) July 8-19

Rising High School Juniors and Seniors

Location: SU Campus

Registration Cost \$500 (Limited Full Scholarships Available)

Prospective college students engage directly with SU faculty on a two-week research project. They enjoy a hands-on science experience with an expert in the field and build community among peers. Students work in teams of four with a faculty member leading each team.

Prerequisite: Students must provide an academic reference once selected.

















All About Health

Monday-Friday, July 15-19

9 a.m.-4 p.m. – Lunch Provided in the Commons

Grades 6-8

Location: SU Campus and TidalHealth (Friday, July 19)

Cost: \$400

Students use health care tools as they discover everything that makes the human body so fascinating. They practice skills like taking vital signs, assessing body movements and investigating cells with microscopes. In addition, students learn how to communicate through role-playing activities effectively. They interact with cutting-edge technology like high-fidelity mannequins and a life-size digital anatomy table at SU's Henson Medical Simulation Center. Students spend a day at TidalHealth exploring in a health care hospital setting. Along the way, they interact with health and human services professionals who use these skills, like nurses, social workers, physiologists, therapists, doctors and others.

















Business Simulation Academy

Monday- Friday, June 24-28

9 a.m.-Noon - Lunch Provided in the Commons

Grades 6-12

Location: SU Campus

Cost: \$200

This exciting academy allows students to participate in active business simulation games, that teaches them about business processes and activities. They learn basic accounting, decision analysis and business processes while using an enterprise system. They gain hands-on experience to understand the format, and structure for business tasks and reports.

















■ Eastern Shore Writing Project: Young Writers Workshop

Monday-Friday, June 24-28

9 a.m.-Noon - Lunch Provided in the Commons

Grades 3-5

Location: SU Campus

Cost: \$200

This exciting academy offers students a space for informal, playful, creative and expressive writing. The students have the opportunity to sharpen their writing skills, develop a creative writing project and collaborate with their peers. On the last day, students share a piece of their original writing during an open mic showcase!

















■ We Read to Change Book Club Academy

Monday-Friday, June 24-28

9 a.m.-Noon - Lunch Provided in the Commons

Grades 6-8

Location: SU Campus

Cost: \$200

This half-day academy is a week-long book club experience for students in middle school who love to read and are passionate about social change. The students interact with their peers by reading the same novel during the week. They engage in discussions and other activities to accompany the book that they are reading. The reading and activities are facilitated by an instructor and two teaching assistants. The students have the opportunity to improve their reading skills, participate in critical-thinking activities, socially engage with their peers and visit an area non-profit agency that assists members of our community.

Middle and High School Students

Location: SU Campus, Local Waterways and Assateague Island

Cost: \$250

This academy informs and inspires students to learn more about the environment and global challenges through canoeing around the waterways of the Eastern Shore. Students learn how they can be a voice and find ways to help others understand global issues related to the watershed of the Chesapeake Bay.

Prerequisite: Students must be able to swim.

















■ 3D Printing Explorers Academy

Monday-Friday

Grades 3-5: July 8-12 | Grades 6-8: July 22-26

9 a.m.-Noon (Lunch Is Not Provided)

Location: Rommel Entrepreneurship Center - Salisbury University Downtown

Cost: \$200

Journey into making with printers and pens! Welcome to an introduction to 3D printing. Students learn about 3D printing technology and applications. They experience hands-on practice and explore creativity with 3D pens. Students work in teams to brainstorm and work collaboratively on a group project using 3D pen freehand techniques and making 3D structures. Students present their work and receive constructive feedback from their peers. There will be a final showcase event where the students share their projects with family and friends.

















Entrepreneurship Academy

Grades 6-12

Location: Rommel Entrepreneurship Center - Salisbury University Downtown

Cost: \$200

Want to start a business someday? Salisbury University's entrepreneurship team leads students through the process of idea creation, whiteboarding, collaborative thinking, assessment, building ideas, idea design, prototype development, logo and marketing materials, pitch training, and practice. Students participate in a final pitch presentation of their design and marketing plan.

















We Read to Lead Book Club Academy

Monday-Friday, July 15-19

9 a.m.-Noon - Lunch Provided in the Commons

Grades 2-5

Location: SU Campus

Cost: \$200

This half-day academy is a week-long book club experience for students who love to read. The students enjoy the opportunity to read the same books with their new friends, discuss what they read and engage in activities based on the books they share. The students read a different picture book each day! They are able to improve their literacy skills, participate in critical thinking exercises and enjoy social interaction with their peers.

















Scavenger Hunt Academy

Monday-Friday, July 22-26

9 a.m.-Noon - Lunch Provided in the Commons

Grades 6-8

Location: SU Campus

Cost: \$200

This half-day academy provides many opportunities for fun, team building, exercise and critical thinking while two teams of students search the campus of Salisbury University for clues and hidden objects! The teams will be led by instructors and teaching assistants who will make sure the students navigate the campus safely and have game-winning support!

















Live Action Film Academy

Monday-Friday, July 22-26 OR July 29-August 2

9 a.m.-Noon - Lunch Provided in the Commons

Grades 3-9

Location: SU Campus

Cost: \$200

The May Literacy Center Live Action Film Academy lights up for young filmmakers working together to produce their visions on screen. Students hone writing skills and produce and act in their own short films. They engage in storyboarding, script writing, filming and video editing using the latest software tools. A final showcase lets students share their films with family and friends.

















Helpful Information

All required forms with signatures should be returned two weeks before the start of each academy.

Water and snacks are provided each day.

Students should bring any personal needs items

What NOT to bring

- · Toys, stuffed animals, sports equipment
- · Electronic games or gadgets
- Nuts or items that may contain nuts (for the safety of any participants who may be allergic)

PLEASE NOTE: If your child brings a cell phone, it must be kept on mute and put away. If you need to contact your child during programming, please call SEA staff at 410-546-6218.

Drop-Off and Pick-Up

Early drop-off and late pick-up options are not available.

All participants should be checked in and ready to participate at the beginning of their academy.

If the academy is held on the SU campus, parents check their children in and out at the May Literacy Center entrance of Conway Hall. The May Literacy Center is located on the Rt. 13 side of the campus across from the Cook-Out restaurant. The entrance is behind the Harriet Tubman statue.

If the academy is held at the SU Downtown Galleries, parents should check their children in and out at 212 W. Main St. on the Downtown Plaza.

If the academy is over at 4 p.m. then pick-up starts at 4 p.m. If the academy is over at 5 p.m., then pick-up starts at 5 p.m.

Children must be picked up by a parent/guardian or a designated adult.



















Lunch

Lunch is provided for students attending 9 a.m. academies on the main campus of Salisbury University. Students attending the off-campus locations will not be provided with lunch. Students do not need to bring any money with them. Students are escorted to the University dining hall by the teaching assistants assigned to their classroom. The teaching assistants eat lunch with the students and escort them back to the classroom.

The University Commons dining hall is an "all-you-care-to-eat" experience. You can view the daily menu by selecting the menu option for the Commons at: **dining.salisbury.edu/menus**

Menus provide nutrition information as well as vegan, vegetarian, Halal and Smart Choice items. The menu also lists possible allergens associated with each item.

Please discuss healthy food choices and any allergies with your child so they can make informed and safe food choices on their own.

All academy classrooms (on and off campus) provide bottled water and snacks available for student consumption.

Rules and Expectations

This summer, we expect everyone to have a safe, fun and enriching experience as a participant in the Summer Enrichment Academies! In order to ensure that everyone enjoys this great opportunity, we have established some guidelines for acceptable behavior and consequences for not adhering to those guidelines.

Please discuss these guidelines with your child prior to them attending the SEA.

Be Respectful: Show respect by being kind and polite to others. Listen to your instructors and follow their directions. Respect the space you are in by using the supplies and other materials wisely.

Take Responsibility: Do what you are supposed to do. If you do something wrong, make it right by apologizing. Clean up any messes you make.

Participate: Take part in the activities. Even if it's not something you want to do, don't ruin anyone else's fun.

Use Inside Voices When You Are Inside: Remember that the other students in class need to be able to concentrate and study.

Walk: Please make sure you walk. Running and horseplay can cause serious injuries. Running is acceptable if you are outside for an activity and your instructor allows it.

Cooperate: Sometimes other adults may be in your classroom. These adults could be teacher assistants or SEA staff. Please show them the same respect that you show the instructor.

Don't Wander Off: Stay in the program area with the adult staff at all times. Don't leave the classroom unless you are with an adult or you have permission from an adult in the classroom.

Stuff: Please don't bring iPods, video games, toys or other personal items to the program. The staff will not be responsible if these items are lost or stolen. Also, these items can cause a distraction from the activities that your instructor has planned.















Cell Phones: Please keep your cell phones on mute and put away. Again, you are responsible for your cell phone.

Bullying: Bullying or harassment will not be tolerated. There will be children of all ages attending the SEA and everyone should feel safe and welcome.

Keep Your Hands To Yourself: We all need to respect everyone's personal space.

Language: Profanity or any other hurtful language will not be tolerated.

Fighting: Fighting results in immediate removal from the SEA without a refund.

If a student is unable to comply with the guidelines of the Summer Enrichment Academies there will be consequences that align with their negative behavior:

- The instructors, teaching assistants and program staff will speak to the child to find a solution if the child exhibits negative behavior.
- The child will receive a verbal reprimand the first time the negative behavior is shown. The parent/ guardian will be advised of the verbal warning when they come to pick the child up.
- The second occurrence of negative behavior in the same day will result in the child being removed from the classroom space. A teaching assistant will escort the child outside to "cool off" for 10 minutes. At the end of 10 minutes if the teaching assistant does not feel the child is ready to return to the classroom, the child will be escorted to the program office and a phone call will be made to the parent. If the child can return to the classroom after a 10-minute cooling off period, the parent will be advised of the incident when they pick up the child at the end of the day.
- The third occurrence of negative behavior in the same day will result in the parent being called to immediately come and pick the child up. At that time, the parent will have to meet with the program staff and develop a plan to assist the child with being successful. If the child returns the next day and the same pattern of negative behavior is being exhibited, the parent will be asked to remove the child from the program without a refund.
- If a fight occurs between students, the students will be removed from the classroom and brought to the program office. The SU Police may be called depending on the severity of the altercation. After meeting with the parents and hearing a report from the classroom instructors, the program staff will determine if one or both children will be removed from the program without a refund.
- Any threats or actions that pose an immediate threat to the physical or emotional safety of the other children or program staff will result in immediate removal from the program without a refund.
- Vandalism or destruction of property will result in immediate dismissal and loss of refund; the parent will be responsible for any monetary damages.
- · Offensive touching or biting will result in immediate removal from the program without a refund.
- Use of profanity, racial slurs or other offensive language will result in the child being removed from the program for the day. The parent will be asked to pick up the child and talk with program staff. At that time, a decision will be made about the child's status in the program.

Any incident including verbal warnings will be documented daily and the parent/guardian of the child involved will receive a written notice.















Frequently Asked Questions

Are there early drop off and late pick up hours?

No.

Can my child bring their cell phone?

Yes, but the cell phone will have to be muted and put away so that it doesn't cause a distraction or interruption of the planned activities. Your child will be free to use their cell phone during lunch if necessary.

Can I get a refund if my child can't participate for the entire week?

No. Once the specific academy starts, there will not be any refunds given. If something occurs and your child cannot attend any of the days before the academy begins, a refund will be given. A refund must be requested 7 days prior to the start of the program.

What happens if my child gets sent home for behavior or illness and I can't come and pick them up early?

When you complete the Authorization to Release form, be sure to list people that can be available to pick your child up and that have a working cell phone number.

Do I have to physically come in the building to sign my child in and out each day?

Yes, unless prior arrangements have been made with the program staff.

If I have a question or concern, who should I contact?

You should contact the program coordinator or the general oversight director of the Summer Enrichment Academies. Please note that if you call 410-546-6218 between 9-10 a.m. or 3-4:30 p.m., the program staff will be busy with check in/out and facilitating getting the students where they need to be. Please leave a voicemail. You also can email SEA@salisbury.edu.

Can another parent pick up my child at the end of the day?

Yes, if you advise the program staff that morning and sign an authorization form for that day.

Can my child drive themselves to the SEA?

Yes, if your child is legally allowed to drive, you must submit an email to the program coordinator authorizing their permission for this action. The parent/guardian must obtain a Salisbury University parking permit at:

salisbury.edu/visitor-parking

The student cannot transport other students without written permission from their parent/guardian.















Registration Fees and Discounts

The registration cost for each academy is listed on the SEA flyer, website and in this booklet.

The registration fee must be paid before the first day of each academy. Payments are made online only via the registration site.

Students who receive free or reduced lunch receive a \$25 discount for the half-day academies and \$50 discount for the full-day academies on the registration fee.

There are a limited number of FARM discounts available. Please submit an inquiry to sea@salisbury.edu.

Refund Policy

- There are no refunds given for partial attendance.
- If you advise the SEA staff that your child cannot attend 7 days prior to the start date of the chosen academy, a refund will be provided.
- · If your child is asked to leave the SEA due to negative behavior, you will not receive a refund.
- If your child attends an academy and does not wish to return, a refund will not be provided.
- If your child becomes ill on the first or second day of the academy and cannot complete the entire week, you may meet with the SEA program staff to discuss a possible partial refund.

PLEASE NOTE: Registration fees pay for supplies and materials that were purchased for your child to use during the academy.

COVID-19 Protocols

The Summer Enrichment Academies (SEA) personnel take our responsibility to keep your child safe and healthy seriously. The SEA will continue to monitor Salisbury University's COVID-19 policies as well as information from our local health department. - 1. Assumption of Risk and Waiver of Liability: I, individually, and on behalf of my minor child's heirs, successors, assigns and personal representatives, acknowledge and fully understand that my minor child will be engaging in activities that include the risk of injury or death not only resulting from my minor child's actions, inactions or negligence, but the actions, inactions or negligence of others. These risks include, but are not limited to equipment used during the activity, conditions that exist on the premises, and other risks that may not be known or are not reasonably foreseeable. I understand and knowingly agree to assume the risk for my minor child's participation in such activities. I hereby release and forever discharge the University, the University System of Maryland ("USM"), the State of Maryland and its employees, agents, officers, trustees and representatives ("Releasees") from any and all liability whatsoever for any and all damages, losses, or injuries (including death), my minor child sustains to their person or property or both, including but not limited to any claims, demands, actions, causes of action, judgments, damages, expenses and costs, including attorney's fees, which arise out of, result from, occur during or are connected in any manner with my minor child's participation in the Activity and/or any travel incident thereto, except for such damages or injury as may be caused by the gross negligence or actual malice of Releasees.
- 2. Statement of Indemnification: I understand that, although the University has made every reasonable effort to assure my minor child's safety while participating in the Activity, there are unavoidable risks and hereby voluntarily agree on behalf of myself and my minor child's heirs, successors, assigns, and personal representatives, to indemnify, defend and hold harmless the University, the USM, the State of Maryland and its employees, agents, officers, trustees and representative (in their official and individual capacities) from any and all liability, loss, damage or expense, including attorneys' fees that they or any of them incur or sustain as a result of any claims, demands, actions, causes of action, damages, judgments, costs or expenses, including attorneys' fees, which arise out of, occur during, or are in any way connected with my minor child's participation in the Activity or any travel incident thereto unless due to the gross negligence or actual malice of Releasees.
- **3. Transportation:** I understand and agree that should the Activity include transportation away from the University campus, my minor child may be transported in a University vehicle or in a private vehicle driven by University staff or students. If such transportation is part of the Activity, I fully understand and appreciate the dangers, hazards, and risks inherent in the Activity and in any transportation to and from the Activity, which dangers include but are not limited to physical or mental injury, or death.
- **4. Disciplinary Actions:** The University reserves the right to decline, accept, or retain my minor child in the Activity at any time should my minor child's actions or general behavior impede the operation of the Activity or the rights or welfare of any person. Similarly, I understand that should my minor child's conduct violate any state or federal law, the Student Code of Conduct, University personnel regulations or any policy of the Activity, such conduct may also result in legal and/or student conduct/personnel actions and my minor child may be required to leave the Activity at the sole discretion of the University's representatives and agents.

- **5.** I certify that my minor child is fully capable of participating in the Activity without causing harm to him/herself or others. I acknowledge that I am solely responsible for my minor child's safety and well-being, as well as any injuries, property damage or loss during the Activity, except as otherwise noted herein. I am hereby advised and understand that it is my sole responsibility to decline, decrease or cease participation in the Activity if my minor child is unable to participate due to the lack of training, illness, injury or other medical condition.
- **6.** I agree to report to appropriate University officials any condition my minor child has that may require special medical attention or accommodation at least seven (7) days prior to the Activity. I understand that the University will not provide health or accident insurance and I am hereby advised that I may acquire my own insurance for my minor child. I understand that it is solely my responsibility to seek and receive medical evaluation and treatment for my minor child for any symptoms that may arise during the course of participation in the Activity and that the University does not have medical personnel available at the location of the Activity. I grant the University permission to authorize emergency medical treatment, if necessary, for my minor child. I understand and agree that the University assumes no responsibility for any injury or damage that might arise out of or in connection with such authorized emergency medical treatment.
- 7. I understand that although the University will attempt to maintain the Activity as described in its publications, it reserves the right to make changes at any time and for any reason, with or without notice, and that the Releasees shall not be responsible or liable for any loss whatsoever to participants by reason of any such cancellation or change. The right is reserved by the University, in its sole discretion, to cancel the Activity or any aspect thereof if the University determines or believes that any person is or will be in danger if the program or any aspect thereof is continued.
- **8.** I agree that this Assumption of Risk, Liability Waiver, Release and Indemnification Agreement is to be construed, interpreted and enforced under the laws of the State of Maryland and any dispute shall be adjudicated in a court of competent jurisdiction in Wicomico County, MD; and that if any portion hereto is held invalid, the balance hereof shall, notwithstanding, continue in full legal force and effect.

Waiver of Legal Rights: I have signed this Agreement in full recognition and appreciation of the dangers, hazards, and risks of such activities, and I represent that my minor child's participation in the Activity is wholly voluntary. By signing this document I hereby acknowledge that I have read this entire document, that I understand its terms, that by signing it I am giving up substantial legal rights I might otherwise have, and that I have signed it knowingly and voluntarily. I certify that I am at least 18 years of age and that this form is a condition of participation by my minor child in the Activity.
