

### Visitors Are Welcome & Everything Can Change

### **Visitor Screening**

Events sponsored by SU and its affiliates may permit indoor visitors at most locations as long as they adhere to the rooms' COVID-19 capacities and SU's policies regarding COVID-19 screening, face mask requirements and physical distancing.

All visitors must complete an online COVID-19 screening on the day of their visit, prior to coming to campus. As a safety precaution, individuals may be asked to show proof of screening clearance. Access may be denied for non-compliance. In-person screening also may be required at some events.

# Public Memory & Monuments: The Civil War in the Present Saturday, October 16 Conway Hall 179, 10 a.m.-3 p.m.

Part 1 of 3

How do we remember our common past? Who should decide? What is overlooked? The recent furor over Confederate monuments has revived such questions with renewed urgency. Donald Whaley (History - emeritus), Creston Long (History/ Nabb Research Center) and Jim Burton (Communication) interrogate the social history of Civil War monuments, their current status on the Eastern Shore and related legal challenges, and the changing reputation of *The Birth of a Nation* (1915), which President Woodrow Wilson described as "like writing history with lightning."

Since the COVID-19 pandemic began, we've all had to face death in new ways. How can philosophy, psychology and cinema studies help us? Yujia Song (Philosophy and Health Humanities), Meredith Patterson (Psychology) and Elsie Walker (English/Film Studies) use an eye-opening and uplifting range of examples for exploring one of the greatest challenges we all have to face - from the philosophy of grief as an experience made possible by our experiences of love and attachment; to psychological studies of grieving, end-of-life decision making and caregiving; to the wildly different stories of dying and renewal in Life of Pi (2012) and Nomadland (2020).

Our shared humanity is at the center of a conversation about language, justice, public responsibility and reevaluating who is included and who is isolated from the public good.

# Saving San Domingo: A Little-Known Piece of Eastern Shore History Screening & Panel Discussion Wednesday, September 22 Guerrieri Academic Commons, Assembly Hall, 6 p.m.

This film by Tom Horton, Dave Harp and Sandy Cannon-Brown tells the story of San Domingo, MD, founded in 1820, possibly one of the oldest surviving Black communities in the United States. The name and historic records suggest that its founding fathers were mariners who came from Haiti soon after the rebellion there that freed all slaves in 1804. The film helps document the work of Newell Quinton and his family, who strive to preserve the traditions and oral histories of the community. Following the film, join a panel discussion with the filmmakers and members of the Quinton family.

### The Old Home Is Not There: Reflections on Harriet Tubman's Eastern Shore Wednesday, October 13 Conway Hall 153, 6 p.m.



### University System of Maryland Board of Regents Award Winners

- Céline Carayon (History) Forsaken not Forgotten: Memory and Colonial Failures in the Early Atlantic World
- Kristen Walton (History) "For the Wealthe of the Realme and the Libertye of the Same": Politics, Religion, and the Scottish Reformation

Carayon traces how the memory of disasters was mobilized in official printed accounts, personal and official correspondence, and in pictures (maps and engravings) to construct a positive narrative of imperial growth, resulting in revisionist histories of Indigenous trauma and displacement. Walton explores the intersection of politics and religions during the volatile first decade of the Scottish Reformation.

### Sexual Identities & Social Development October 5

- Kara French (History and Gender and Sexuality Studies) -Against Sex: Identities of Sexual Restraint in Early America
- Lance Garmon (Psychology) -Gaming During a Pandemic: Did Young Adults #PlayApartTogether, and Do They Think It Helped?

French considers three groups of 19th-century Americans whose sexual abstinence provoked almost as much concern as the idea of sexual excess and sheds light on the creation of sexual



identities in the present, including the growing visibility of the asexuality movement. Garmon explores whether the already high level of gaming activity by young adults provided them with perceived benefits during the pandemic in areas such as coping, socialization and distraction from reality.

# From Jest to Jazz: Use of Comedy & Chords December 7

- Timothy Stock (Philosophy)
   Finite Jest: Kierkegaard and the Limits of Comedy
- Jerry Tabor (Music, Theatre & Dance) - Using Deep-Structural Harmonic Reinterpretation to Generate Flexible Non-Functional Jazz Chord Successions

Stock's presentation serves as an overview of the interpretation advanced in Laughter's Martyr, a book manuscript on Kierkegaard's theory of the comic and its religious significance. Tabor demonstrates how performers have choices in chord successions and even formal design by using fixed progressions as background schemes that can be reinterpreted and then recomposed. This technique is used by the Jerry Tabor Ear Alliance at the SU Jazz Festival (see page 11).





### Balla Kouyaté Ensemble Thursday, September 9 Red Square, 7 p.m.

The ensemble performs to help kick-off the National Folk Festival's return to Salisbury September 10-12. Balla Kouyaté, world-renowned balafon player, is part of a family lineage of 800 years that is upholding West African traditions. Kouyaté



learned to play the balafon as a child and was soon playing alongside his mother, motivating agricultural laborers during harvest season. As a young adult, he emigrated to the U.S. in 2000 to pursue music as a profession, settling in Massachusetts. Kouyaté is featured on more than 25 albums, including the work of Yo-Yo Ma.

## Rethinking Indigenous History Through Archaeology, or Colonization from a Piscataway Point-of-View

The Piscataway chiefdom controlled much of the lower Western Shore of Maryland when Englishmen invaded this landscape in the early 17th century. The colonizers left behind valuable, but nonetheless limited, records of these encounters. Fortunately, an even more valuable archive can be found buried in the ground. This presentation by Julia King, professor of anthropology at St. Mary's College, uses artifacts and

other landscape features unearthed through archaeological

investigation to describe an Indigenous history of colonial Maryland in the face of both territorial and bodily displacement. King is one of the

displacement. King is one of the premier scholars in historical archaeology and the history of the Chesapeake. She recently received a substantial archaeology grant from the National Park Services to fund a complete archeological overview and assessment of Piscataway Park in Prince George's County, MD.




