EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Housing and Residence Life continues to be an integral part of the Student Affairs Division at Salisbury University.

The Office of Housing and Residence Life's mission is to foster an inclusive community which inspires lifelong learning, responsible living and academic success. Through our mission, Housing and Residence Life cultivates an atmosphere which supports a student's identity development, self-empowerment, intellectual pursuit, celebration of diversity, interpersonal skills, and meaningful connections. Approximately 2,200 spaces are provided for undergraduate students.

We continue to collaborate with many other departments on campus. Some of the offices we partner with include The Dean of Students Office, The Office of Institutional Equity, The Counseling Center, University Police, Academic Affairs, Disability Resource Center, Diversity Equity and Inclusion, and the Orientation Office.

Housing and Residence Life also values diversity. We feel strongly that this is a priority for the department. We have so many students from various backgrounds, and it is extremely important to have a diverse staff that represents those various backgrounds.

Because of this, we try to reflect that diversity in the staff that we hire. Amongst our Building Director staff, 8 of the 13 staff came from an underrepresented group. This breaks down that 4 of our 9 Resident Directors, and 4 of our 4 Area Director staff were from an underrepresented group. We also had 25 of our 64 Resident Assistant Staff from an underrepresented group. This is an area of pride for the department.

Section I: Department Overview

Vision: Through our mission, Housing and Residence Life cultivates an atmosphere which supports a student's identity development, self-empowerment, intellectual pursuit, celebration of diversity, interpersonal skills, as well as helps them to make meaningful connections.

Mission: Housing and Residence Life fosters an inclusive community which inspires lifelong learning, responsible living and academic success.

FY22-23 Accomplishment:

1. Continued focus on diversity and inclusion programming. Completed "Charm City Sea Gull" initiative as directed by the provost's office. Partnered with ODI and Academic Services to fulfill expectations from a Baltimore based grant program. ONGOING

2. Moved into a second year with SLATE having the new student contract. Still quite buggy as SLATE is not bridging back and forth when changes are made in peoplesoft. IT, HRL and Admissions are working to resolve this issue.

3. Continued Salto system change. We completed front door access with SALTO. Installed and completed Severn, Chester, St Martin, Sea Gull Village (exterior doors) Manokin, Pocomoke, Wicomico halls. We also participated in the planning on the completion of Sea Gull Square apartment doors and Chesapeake (if needed).

4. Update policies and procedures where needed. We updated policies for fire evacuation plans. We did this in partnership with the DRC and Environmental Safety Office.

5. Cross train staff in operations, as well as other functional areas. This is an ongoing initiative as young professionals intending on pursuing HRL as a career need a firm foundation in building operations.

6. Furniture replacement plan. Purchased and installed new lounge furniture for Sea Gull Village, Mattresses for Chester, Choptank, Pocomoke and 2/3 of Wicomico halls. New Chairs for Pocomoke and desk shelves for Nanticoke have been ordered and waiting delivery.

7. Converted 3, 1st floor Sea Gull Square apartments through a retrofit renovation to meet the needs of students with mobility challenges. Prior to this change all ADA apartments were located on upper floors creating extreme challenges during emergency evacuations.

8. Created Special Interest Housing options during the late fall 22 early spring 23. Transfer, IDEAA, Leadership and ESports SIH options were explored for creation. Due to the late launch for marketing the options IDEAA, Leadership and ESports will move to launch Fall 24. Transfer SIH had a successful launch and will be a pilot community this fall 23.

9. Created a RA meal type and room type with the cooperation of UDS, Financial services and the ADMIN and Finance leadership to eliminate the perceived inequity in RA compensation created by different room rates across campus.

HRL budget was cut to bone marrow entering the fiscal year. We cut back additional hours of the student staff for SGS (desk attendant) and the summer crew. We completed our summer project list prior to fall opening thanks to a small, committed student work crew.

We negotiated with UDS and Financial Services to create an item type for RA room and meals for numerous reasons which will begin the 2023-2024 year. The main being a perception RAs had that there was an inequitable pay system.

We were able to advocate for some remaining FEMA dollars to purchase mattresses, chairs, desk shelves and replacement upholstery cut from the previous year's budget.

** on the plus side we had an increase in housing revenue of 1.5 million from the 2021-2022 year to 2022-2023

Goal 1: Student Affairs aims to foster safe, accessible and inclusive communities for undergraduate and graduate students.

- Residence Life provides safe, accessible, and inclusive communities for our students to live in. This happens through programming (both RA programs, as well as partnering with other offices). Some of the collaborative programs include Pride Week (various offices), Coffee with a Cop (University Police), Campus Safety Awareness Week (various offices), Out of the Darkness (Counseling Center), and Take Back the Night (various offices).
- 2. We have staff on call 24/7, 365 days a year. This includes both RA staff, as well as professional staff to help with any emergency that may happen.
- 3. Our residence halls are locked 24/7 and require a student to use their ID card to gain entrance. There are also cameras strategically situated in elevators, around the main floor, as well as in some stairwells to provide an additional layer of security.
- 4. Residence Life partners with the Disability Resource Center for students who want to be approved for emotional support animals.
- 5. Residence Life offers gender inclusive housing for our students.
- 6. Residence Life partners with the Office of Institutional Equity to bring programming into the residence halls around the topics of open mindedness and embracing differences.

Goal 2: Student Affairs aims to educate students for campus, career, and life.

- Residence Life provides many ways in which we educate our students. Education happens through RA programs, bulletin boards, campus wide Residential Life programs, supporting University programs, and community outreach. Our program model is based on Learning Reconsidered. This is a publication developed from a variety of different organizations within Higher Education focusing on the learning that is happening outside the classroom. We digitally track these programs to ensure we are providing students with exposure to a variety of different topics to broaden their understanding of themselves and the world around them.
- 2. Another way in which we foster educational moments is through floor meetings, roommate agreements, roommate mediations, and other personal interactions with residents on a daily basis.

3. We also help students learn and grow through our student conduct process. Our staff help students learn and grow from mistakes that they have made while living in the Residence Halls.

Goal 3: Student Affairs aims to embrace innovation.

- 1. Starting the fall of 2019 Residence Life began tracking students who attend programs on an individual level through Involved. This helps us to better understand what residents attend programs, and to better help inform any changes that we make to the program model for future years.
- 2. We have worked with Student Activities to utilize Involved to keep track of programs, as well as student attendance. We also implemented using involved for RA selection. This went very well, and we plan to continue this in the coming years.
- 3. Residence Life has moved most of the documents and forms that staff use into either the One Drive, or the SU Involved website. This allows staff to more easily access and share information. Using the One Drive also helps to keep student data private, versus using Google.
- 4. All hall opening and closing processes moved to a contactless digital process. This improved efficiencies and also saves us from additional printing and paper costs.
- 5. We continue to the transition to SALTO locks. This is a new key system that uses new technology to update locks. Once complete, this will be a great improvement for tracking and comprehensive safety.
- 6. Utilized a QR code, and the One Drive to digitally track student lock outs.

Goal 4: Student Affairs aims to motivate student affairs professionals to increase effectiveness and efficiency.

- Residence Life provides our staff with a variety of professional development opportunities throughout the year. Staff have the opportunity to attend either a regional or national conference of their choosing. Again unfortunately, while we could not financially support this, they were given time away if they chose to attend a conference. The department also invests in webinars on a variety of different topics throughout the year.
- 2. We were contacted by OIE to have some of our staff participate in additional ATIXA training related to Title IX boards (Park Chin, Paul DeCock, and Dave Gutoskey).
- 3. Dave Gutoskey completed NABITA training on BIT Standards and Best Practices. They will utilize this training as a member and alternate member on the Universities Care Team.

Goal 2: EMBRACE Innovation of the Salisbury University Experience

- 1. Prior to the fall of 2016 RA programs were not tracked on a department wide basis. Some individual areas tracked program data, but it was inconsistent, and not uniform. Starting in the fall semester of 2016 that changed. Residence Life now tracks all items related to programming in the residence halls via an electronic document.
- 2. Starting the fall of 2018 Residence Life began tracking students who attend programs on an individual level. This helps us to better understand what residents attend programs, and to better help inform any changes that we make to the program model for future years.
- 3. We have worked with Student Activities to utilize Involved to keep track of programs, and track student attendance.
- 4. Residence Life has moved most of the documents and forms that staff use into either a shared One Drive, or the SU Involved website. This allows staff to more easily access and share information.
- 5. Residence Life has embraced the One Drive, and the functionality that it provides to track a variety of departmental items including RA Applications, Duty Logs, Lock outs, and Community Maps.

Goal 3: FOSTER Community

Fostering Community is the heart of what Residence Life does on a daily basis. It is a core component of both our mission and our vision.

Residence Life provides safe, accessible, and inclusive communities for our students to live in. This
happens through programming (both RA programs, as well as partnering with other offices). Some of
the collaborative programs include Pride Week (various offices), Sexual Assault Awareness Week
(various offices), Coffee with a Cop (University Police), Diversity Week (various offices), Out of the
Darkness Walk (Counseling Center), and Campus Safety Awareness Week (various offices).

- 2. We have staff on call 24/7, 365 days a year. This includes both RA staff, as well as professional staff to help with any emergency that may happen.
- 3. Our residence halls are locked 24/7 and require a student to use their ID card to gain entrance. There are also cameras strategically situated in elevators, around the main floor, as well as in some stairwells to provide an additional layer of security.
- 4. Residence Life partners with the Disability Resource Center for students who want to be approved for emotional support animals, as well as other accommodations.
- 5. Residence Life offers gender inclusive housing for our students. This current freshman class has 9 self-identified transitioning students in need of GIH.
- 6. Residence Life partners with the Office of Institutional Equity to bring programming into the residence halls around the topics of open mindedness and embracing differences.
- 7. Residence Life quickly engages with our students when an on-campus emergency arises.
- 8. Residence Life partners with Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion to train staff, as well as program around topics related to DEI topics. We started to utilize their office more this year and believe that this partnership will grow in the coming years.
- Dave, Park and Paul participated in a new 5-week training series entitled *Every Person, All Day, Every Day: Diversity and Inclusion Initiatives.* The training was based around the book "Everyday Bias". They were part of a small cohort of colleagues from around campus who read the book and met weekly to talk about it. This training was put on by the Office of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion.

Goal 4: PROVIDE Appropriate Programs, Spaces, and Resources for All Members of the Campus Community

- 1. We support campus partners' program efforts throughout campus. We do this in a variety of different ways. To help support and also increase attendance we have added attending their programs into our RA program model. We also advertise for their programs in the residence halls, as well as allow our space for their usage when appropriate.
- 2. Through our Living Learning Communities (LLC's), we provide classroom space in some of our Residence Halls. We also help support faculty programming for the LLC's.
- 3. We do a number of community service projects that benefit the local Salisbury Community. The main project that we do supports the Chesapeake Housing Mission through ramp builds.
