FLIGHT PLAN

1 ADMISSIONS DEPOSIT

To officially become a Sea Gull, a \$300 non-refundable admissions deposit is required by May 1. Log into your Future Sea Gull Portal to complete your Reply Form.

2 HOUSING CONTRACT

The Housing Contract is linked directly to admissions acceptance and is available in your Future Sea Gull Portal on the Checklist. We recommend filling it out sooner rather than later!

3 SEA GULL START-UP

- ✓ Beginning in mid-to-late April, complete your orientation survey and register for a Sea Gull Start-Up date within the Future Sea Gull Portal.
- ✓ Academic Advising Team members and Orientation staff members will guide new students and families through an informative one-day experience to make sure students are ready for fall.

4 REQUIRED TRAININGS

To help ensure all students have important foundational knowledge, the University requires all incoming students to complete several required trainings before they start taking classes. Required trainings will become available in early July.

5 HOUSING PLACEMENT

Housing assignments are emailed in mid-July to students' SU email accounts. You should begin monitoring email daily after you attend Sea Gull Start-Up.

6 TIME TO DROP OFF YOUR SEA GULL!

Placement letters - including specific move-in times - are emailed beginning mid-July.

7 FIRST FLIGHT

New Sea Gulls join us in August, the weekend before classes, for your required multi-day, in-person experience. Students connect with peers and meet the Gull Squad, explore campus, learn about resources and expectations to support their journey, and have some fun!

Continue to monitor your Future Sea Gull Portal for items that need to be completed before your arrival.

Office of Access and Accommodations (OAA) Student Transition, Access, Retention and Success (STARS)

The OAA STARS Program embraces disability as a dimension of diversity and represents the University's commitment to fostering an inclusive environment through the appreciation and respect of all differences. TRIO Scholars Bridge Program

The TRIO Scholars Bridge Program at Salisbury University is an early arrival orientation experience designed to help incoming students transition smoothly into college life before the start of the semester. As part of the three federally funded TRIO Student Support Services Programs, sponsored by the U.S. Department of Education, this program supports first-generation students, students with financial need, and students with disabilities in achieving their academic and personal goals.

The Bridge Program provides a unique opportunity for students to move in early, build community, and gain a strong foundation for success - socially, professionally, and academically. Through this immersive experience, students are introduced to campus resources, connect with peers and staff, and begin developing the skills needed to persist and graduate from Salisbury University.

During the TRIO Scholars Bridge Program:

- **Skill-Building:** Participate in master classes focused on financial literacy, academic success, and career readiness.
- **Navigation:** Take part in a "Find Your Classes" campus tour and explore key university resources.
- **Early Access:** Move into your residence halls early (if living on campus).
- **Community:** Engage in fun activities, games, and community-building experiences.
- **Support:** Gain access to TRIO's dedicated study spaces and supportive staff.

The TRIO Scholars Bridge Program is open to students who meet at least one of the following criteria: first-generation college students, students with demonstrated financial need (Pell-eligible), or students with physical, learning, or mental disabilities.

At TRIO, your success is our success - and the TRIO Scholars Bridge Program is just the beginning of your journey.

Powerful Connections (PowCon)

Powerful Connections is a peer mentor-based, pre-semester experience held one week before the start of each semester. Designed to help new students begin their university journey with confidence, the program supports a smooth and successful transition to campus life. Participants move in early and engage in dynamic academic and social sessions that foster connection, build community, and familiarize them with campus resources. As part of the experience, each student is paired with an upperclassman mentor, cultivating meaningful relationships and connecting them to peers, faculty, staff, and essential campus support from day one.

Academic Advising

Understanding Your First Semester Schedule

Each student's schedule is carefully crafted using the guidance that students provided on the Orientation Survey. Academic interests and First Year Seminar preferences are considered along with the student's:

- Earned credits through dual enrollment, transfer credits from another institution and/or self-reported Advanced Placement or International Baccalaureate credits.
- Interest in pre-health programs or pre-law.
- Admission into the Clarke Honors College.
- Participation in NCAA sports.
- Interest in a study abroad/study away opportunity.
- Housing choice (on campus versus commuter).

We make sure each student starts out on a four-year path to graduation. When crafting a student's schedule, it is important that there is time for studying, meals, sleeping and participating in campus activities. We realize that after Orientation, students may change their minds about their academic interest before courses begin and may need to make schedule adjustments. We are happy to assist you to assure schedule changes are smooth and you remain on a track toward four-year degree completion.

Academic Advising & You

All first-year, full-time students are assigned an academic advisor in their area of interest. You'll meet with them regularly so you can:

- Clarify your ambitions
- Engage in the curriculum and meet requirements
- Navigate registration software and work in GullNet
- Select appropriate courses
- Locate campus resources
- Create four-year plans utilizing Undergraduate Curriculum Guides
- Evaluate your progress in meeting degree requirements
- Understand the decision-making process
- Make informed decisions on your path toward graduation

In addition to the academic advisors, many specialized majors, programs and colleges assign a secondary advisor or program mentor to help you navigate their complexities. As you progress in your major, you'll be advised by a faculty mentor within your discipline who is an expert in your field of study and can guide you toward graduation and beyond. All transfer students are assigned to a faculty mentor and have an Advising Services Coordinator (ASC) who is responsible for providing individual support to SU's schools and colleges and may work with all students during their time at Salisbury University.

Additional Requirements

- **First Year Seminar (FYS):** Academic preparation, skills and expectations for educational and professional success through exploration of a topic or issues.
- **Communicating Through Writing (CTW):** Effective reading, writing and information usage.
- **Quantitative Analysis (QA):** Numerical, analytical, statistical and problem-solving skills.
- **Human Expression (HE):** Exploration of the different ways individuals and societies have and continue to express themselves and communicate the human experience.
- **Humanity in Context (HIC):** Critical and comparative analysis of humanity, emphasizing the role of history, culture and/or language in human issues.
- **Social Configurations (SC):** Quantitative and/or qualitative analysis of human behavior and/or societies.
- **Social Issues (SI):** Applied social science, with an emphasis on understanding and solving problems in the social or behavioral sciences.
- **Hands-on Science (HOS):** Experiential laboratory-based science.
- **Solutions Through Science (STS):** Applied science, with an emphasis on understanding and solving problems in the natural and physical sciences (may or may not include a lab).
- **Personal Wellness (PW):** Interconnected dimensions of wellness, including physical, emotional and financial, to live a healthy, successful life.
- **Experiential Learning (EL):** Apply knowledge and competencies from General Education through internship, study abroad/away, research, senior project or other relevant experience.

Family Educational Rights & Privacy Act (FERPA)

The Family Education Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) is a federal law that protects the privacy of student education records. FERPA affords eligible students certain rights with respect to their educational records. An “eligible student” under FERPA is a student who is 18 years of age or older or who attends a postsecondary institution.

Under the provisions of the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act, SU provides student directory information without prior consent of students. Directory information includes a student’s name, home address, major fields of study, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, weight and height (of an athletic team member), terms of attendance, degrees and awards received, and most recent previous educational agency or institution attended, as well as a listing of officers of student organizations (including names and addresses).

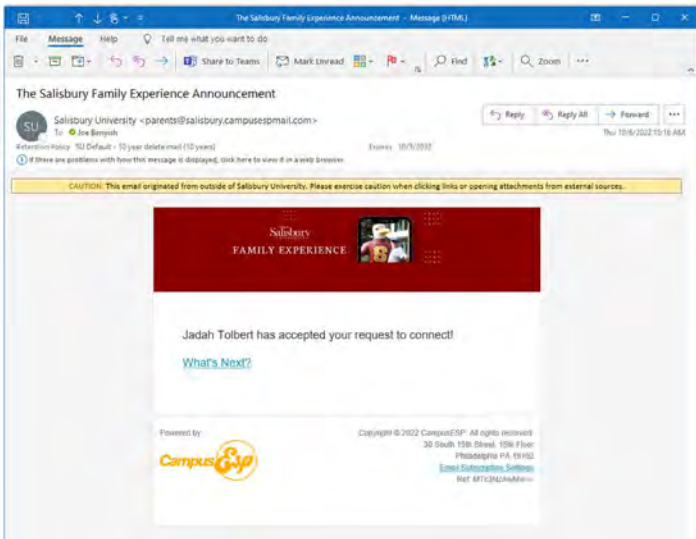

Academic Glossary of Terms

- **Academic Advisor/Faculty Mentor:** The student's primary contact person. All students are assigned an academic advisor and/or faculty mentor, and all students must meet with that person before being activated to register each semester. The advisor's name is found in GullNet in the Student Center.
- **Academic Probation:** The academic status of students who have below a 2.0 cumulative GPA. Students who are placed on academic probation receive extra outreach from the Academic Advising Center and the Center for Student Achievement.
- **Alerts:** Within the Navigate platform, an opportunity for faculty to provide academic concerns or kudos about any student throughout the semester.
- **Apostille:** An apostille certifies the signature and the position of the official who has executed, issued or certified a copy of a document.
- **Catalog (Undergraduate and Graduate):** The online document that outlines academic policies, university requirements, undergraduate and graduate curriculum, and course descriptions. Students are governed by the catalog that was current at the time that they enrolled at SU.
- **Catalog Year:** Each student's Academic Requirements Report (a.k.a.: Graduation Audit) is linked to a catalog year. Students are required to fulfill all general education, major, minor, and university requirements that were active in that catalog year. If students change catalog years due to adding a newly created major, program, minor and/or focus/track/concentration, they are then required to fulfill the requirements listed in that new catalog.
- **Corequisite:** A course that must be taken at the same time as another course. If a course has a corequisite, it will be noted in the course description in the catalog and in GullNet.
- **Course Load:** The number of credits a student takes in a given term. To be considered full time, during fall and spring semesters you must be enrolled for:
 - 12 credit hours (undergraduate students)
 - 9 credit hours (graduate students)
 - 6 credit hours (graduate students with graduate assistantship)
- **Concentration/Track:** A subset of classes within some majors that allow an opportunity for students to focus on a specific topic within the major.
- **Credit Hour:** The unit used to indicate how much credit a class is worth. One credit hour is typically equal to one hour of instruction per week for a 15-week semester. Most courses are worth 3 or 4 credits.
- **Dean's List:** Compiled and issued after each fall and spring semester by the school deans' offices. To be eligible, a matriculated student must have at least 12 semester hours with letters grades of A, B or C (no incomplete or pass/fail grades) with a GPA average of 3.5 or higher for the semester.
- **Drop/Add Period:** A timeframe at the beginning of each term where students can add, drop or swap classes without the changes appearing on their transcripts or affecting their GPAs.
- **Elective Credit:** Credit hours/courses that are not part of the student's major or minor requirements. They can be applied to the overall credit count required for graduation.
- **FERPA (Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974):** A federal law that specifies the rights of students regarding their educational records and their right to privacy.
- **FERPA Release of Information:** An electronic form, available in GullNet, that allows students to give permission for other individuals to access academic, billing, financial aid, grades and/or conduct information about the student.
- **FERPA Release of Information (Parent Portal):** Requests are made by parents via the Family Experience Portal to the student for permission to view access to academic (grades/schedules), billing and financial aid information about the student.
- **FERPA Restrict Directory Information:** An electronic form, available in GullNet, that students complete if they would like to restrict the university from releasing information about them that is exempt from FERPA.
- **General Education:** A set of courses in a variety of disciplines that help build a foundation for success in the major and provide a breadth of knowledge in a variety of areas.
- **GPA (Grade Point Average):** A number that represents the average value of the final grades that students have earned in all their courses throughout their time at SU. Transfer grades do not impact SU's GPA. The highest GPA a student can earn at SU is a 4.0.
- **GullNet:** The online portal where students can see their schedules, check their grades, manage billing and financial aid matters, register for classes, withdraw from classes, etc.
- **Major:** The primary academic discipline that an undergraduate student chooses to study. Each major requires a specific number of classes and credits. All students must have a major.
- **Mid-Semester Grades:** A notice given halfway through the semester to students who are earning a D or an F in any of their courses. Not all faculty participate in recording mid-semester grade reporting.
- **Minor:** A field of study that students can choose as a secondary discipline. Minors require fewer credits than majors. While optional for most, a number of majors require that students also choose a minor.
- **MyClasses:** MyClasses is the campus supported learning management system for online, hybrid and traditional courses. MyClasses operates using Canvas. Student enrollment for the current semester and session is updated every four hours. Student enrollment to courses occurs one month prior to the semester start date. Accounts in MyClasses are created through course enrollment.
- **Navigate:** Navigate aims to improve communication, streamline student outreach efforts, and provide data-driven insight with the goal of

improving retention and graduation rates at SU. The platform provides analytic insights specific to student academic performance, offers a centralized note system for advising and support services, and serves as a scheduling tool for academic advising, faculty office hours and more.

- **Non-Degree:** Students who are not in a degree-seeking program. Registration is limited to eight credit hours.
- **Open Enrollment:** Open enrollment starts mid-July for fall semester and mid-January for spring semester. All current students will have access to register and make changes to their class schedule. Students are not required to meet with their advisor to participate in open enrollment. Registration takes place starting at 12:01 a.m. via GullNet during open enrollment. Please review the Registrar's Calendar for the specific dates in July and January.
- **Overload:** An undergraduate student taking more than 19 credits in one semester. Students must follow the procedure outlined in the catalog to obtain permission to take more than 19 credits in a semester.
- **Prerequisite:** A course that must be successfully completed prior to taking another course. Not all courses have prerequisites. If a course has a prerequisite, it will be noted in the course description in the catalog and in GullNet.
- **Program Planning:** Designated times before the middle of the fall and spring semesters when you meet with your academic advisor, faculty mentor or program director to review your degree requirements, discuss course options, academic goals, and experiential learning opportunities.
- **Progress Reports:** Within the Navigate platform, an opportunity for faculty to provide academic concerns or kudos about new students after the third week of classes.
- **Provost:** A college or university provost is the chief academic officer for the institution. The Office of the Provost oversees all academic matters, including faculty concerns.

- **Request to Study at Another Institution:** A form that must be completed and submitted to the Registrar's Office before current SU students can take courses at another institution. It provides the student with information on if and how the course will transfer to SU.
- **Quality Points:** Letter grades are assigned a number that is used to calculate an undergraduate student's GPA: A=4, B=3, C=2, D=1, and F, WF, FX= 0. For graduate students the quality point numbers are: A=4.0, B+=3.5, B=3.0, C+=2.5, C=2.0, D=1.0, and F/WF=0.0.
- **Registrar:** The University Registrar is the official responsible for maintaining all student records at SU as well as to ensure that all records are kept confidential (see FERPA).
- **Restricted Status:** The academic status of students who have been dismissed as degree-seeking students due to unsatisfactory academic progress. Restricted status students are allowed to enroll as non-degree students but are limited to enrolling in eight credits a semester.
- **Sea Gull Scheduler:** A tool provided by the Academic Advising Center to assist students in optimizing their course schedules.
- **Syllabus:** A document that outlines the learning objectives, policies, assignments and schedule for each course.
- **Transcript:** A record of all courses that a student attempted and the grade earned in each course.
- **Withdraw:** When a student chooses to discontinue a class after the drop/add period but before the withdrawal deadline. Students earn a grade of W which does not affect their GPA.

Housing & Residence Life

SU is a great place to start your college career, and residence halls are an ideal place to broaden your life experiences. Over 3,100 students live in our residence halls on the main SU campus, which includes University Park Apartments.

Salisbury University has a two-year residency requirement for all freshman and sophomore students. Freshman students beginning in the fall semester are required to live on campus for four semesters, and students beginning in the spring semester live on campus for three semesters.

Housing placements are based on several factors, including housing contract completion date and Special Interest Housing preferences. Housing placements are sent mid-July (for the fall semester) and mid-January (for the spring semester).

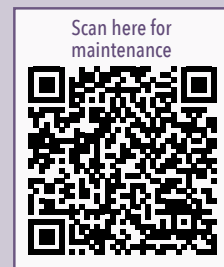
What Does Support Look Like in the Residence Halls?

In the residence halls, we have a variety of staff who live in the buildings and provide support for our students. Resident Assistants (RAs) are community builders that help students with the transition to living on campus. RAs are students who are trained to help with many situations that may arise for residents. We also have Resident Directors (RDs) who are graduate students, as well as Area Directors (ADs) who are master's-level professionals collectively known as building directors who live and work in our residence halls and help support both the RAs as well as our residential students.

It is always helpful to be prepared for emergencies. We encourage you to discuss your plans in case of an emergency with your family. Check with your insurance company to determine if your personal belongings are covered. If not, renter's insurance is highly recommended.

Two common topics that come up for first-year students:

- Roommate conflict: Students should work with their RA or building director for support navigating roommate conflicts.
- Request a maintenance repair: Students can submit a work order online by scanning QR code or 410-677-3097. They may also notify the on-call staff in the event of an emergency repair need.



Plan for Breaks Periods!

Severn, Chester, Choptank, Nanticoke, Wicomico, Pocomoke, Manokin, St. Martin, Chesapeake and Dogwood Village are all closed during Thanksgiving, winter and spring breaks. Students are not permitted to stay on campus during break closures unless they are assigned to Sea Gull Square and Sea Gull Village.

Introduction/Background

The Plymouth Tube Company plant is located on Industrial Parkway, the north prong of the Wicomico River. The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) RSEI scores it is the most problematic facility in Wicomico County, Maryland. The EPA issues "Risk-Screening Environmental Indicators" (RSEI) level model that analyzes factors that contribute to human health, including the amount of chemical released, the degree of toxicity, and the "exposed population" (EPA, 2022). Plymouth Tube Co.'s RSEI score is 32, with median for similar facilities being only 32, and the closest in Somerset County being Purdue Agribusiness with a score of 88.



Definitions and Methodology

The EPA has Environmental Justice Indexes (EJ Index¹) which is a combination of certain environmental indicator percentile for a block group, time of day, and population for the block group².

The EJ index highlights block groups with the highest intersection of high populations, people of color, and a given environmental indicator. The three: Air Toxics Cancer Risk, Toxic Releases to Air, and Hazardous Waste. The percentiles of the 72 block groups in Wicomico County on the EJ Index. The areas surrounding the Plymouth Tube Factory, the impact of the EJ Index on the facility are evident.

Plymouth Tube stated that in the summer months production rates are high and in December it is significantly less. I analyzed wind roses for the months in July and compared them to the patterns of higher EJ Index. The EJ Index in Wicomico County in areas around the factory. During these months, the easterly winds, which correlates with the patterns of distribution of EJ Index, were analyzed.

¹ EJ Index = (Environmental Indicator Percentile for Block Group) X (Demographic Index for Block Group)
² The standard unit of analysis in EJScreen is the Census "block group." A block group is an area defined by the Census Bureau in the range of 600-3,000 people living in it. The US is divided into more than 230,000 block groups. For more detail that Census data can be publicly shared. (EPA)

■ eBooks

eBooks are available for selected titles. Students download an eBook directly to their computer or eReader. Typically, these downloads are good anywhere from six months to one year, and some are a lifetime subscription.

■ Inclusive Access

Courses with inclusive access are digital course materials that are accessible directly through MY CLASSES and are billed directly to the student account.

Office of Financial Aid & Scholarships

Planning how to pay for college is an important part of beginning your journey at Salisbury University. A degree is a meaningful investment, and many students use financial aid to help make it possible. Our office is here to guide you with clear communication, timely support, and personalized assistance.

Getting Started

- Submit the FAFSA each year at studentaid.gov. It opens every October 1 for the next academic year and ensures you receive a complete aid offer.
- Review your long-term budget and consider how much your family can contribute over four years.
- Search for scholarships through SU, your community, and private organizations.

Understanding Costs

Focus on the net price, which reflects your estimated out-of-pocket cost after grants and scholarships. Many families choose to finance tuition, fees, housing, and meals while paying for books, supplies, and personal expenses directly. SU bills by semester, and remaining balances can often be managed through personal resources or the semester-based payment plan.

Types Of Aid

Students may receive grants, loans, work-study, and scholarships based on financial need, academic achievement, or both.

- **Grants** are gift aid that does not need to be repaid. Examples include the Federal Pell Grant, Federal SEOG, EA and GA Grants (Maryland residents), SU Fund, SU Grant, and the Maryland Success Grant (Maryland residents).
- **Loans** must be repaid but often allow you to postpone payments until after graduation. Options include Federal Direct Student Loans, Federal Parent PLUS Loans, and private education loans. Federal loans offer benefits such as low fixed interest rates and multiple repayment plans.
- **Federal Work-Study** allows eligible students to earn wages through part-time campus employment. Positions are limited and require financial need as determined by the FAFSA. Employment is not guaranteed; students apply, interview, and are hired directly by campus departments.
- **Scholarships** may be awarded for a semester, a full year, or multiple years. Criteria vary and may include academic achievement, major, or service commitments. Maryland residents should also explore state scholarships through the Maryland Higher Education Commission.

- **SU Scholarships** awarded about two million dollars in scholarships during the 2025-2026 academic year. Some awards, including our SU Academic Merit Scholarships, are determined using information submitted during the admissions process or already available in our system (i.e., major). Other awards may require additional information such as an essay or a letter of reference. The scholarship application for fall 2026-spring 2027 opened December 1, and deadlines vary. Students are encouraged to complete a new general application every December and review their "recommended" list as well as "external opportunities" while in their SU scholarship portal.

NOTE: SU generates electronic billing statements for all students once a month and is sent to the student's @gulls.salisbury.edu email address - SU does not mail paper bills. If changes have been made since the electronic bill was generated, please review your account using GullNet. Fall billing statements will be generated around the middle of July and Spring billing statements will be generated at the beginning of December for pre-registered students. Email notifications are sent to the SU student email once billing statements are available to view. Parents/guardians can also receive email notifications by adding them as an Authorized User.

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Authorized Users

Students can invite anyone to have access to their student billing information (make payments, view electronic bills, tuition payment plans, email statement notifications, and text messages). To invite your parent or other persons as authorized users:

- Sign into GullNet
- Go to Classic Home tile > Bills/Payments/PayPlans> Refund
- Once in Transact/CashNet look in the left menu: My Account > Payers > Send a Payer Invitation. Fill in the required information.
- The authorized user will receive an email with a temporary password and link

- Authorized users will click the link and enter their username and temporary password, then create a new password and security question – once completed, users will be directed to the student account

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Grad Guard

Salisbury University has partnered with GradGuard™ to offer tuition insurance. The Tuition Protection Plan was designed with students and their families in mind. It can reimburse tuition payments, housing costs, and other non-refundable college expenses if a student needs to **withdraw from school any time during the semester** for any covered reason such as illness, injury or psychological condition. This coverage strengthens and broadens the school's existing refund policy.
